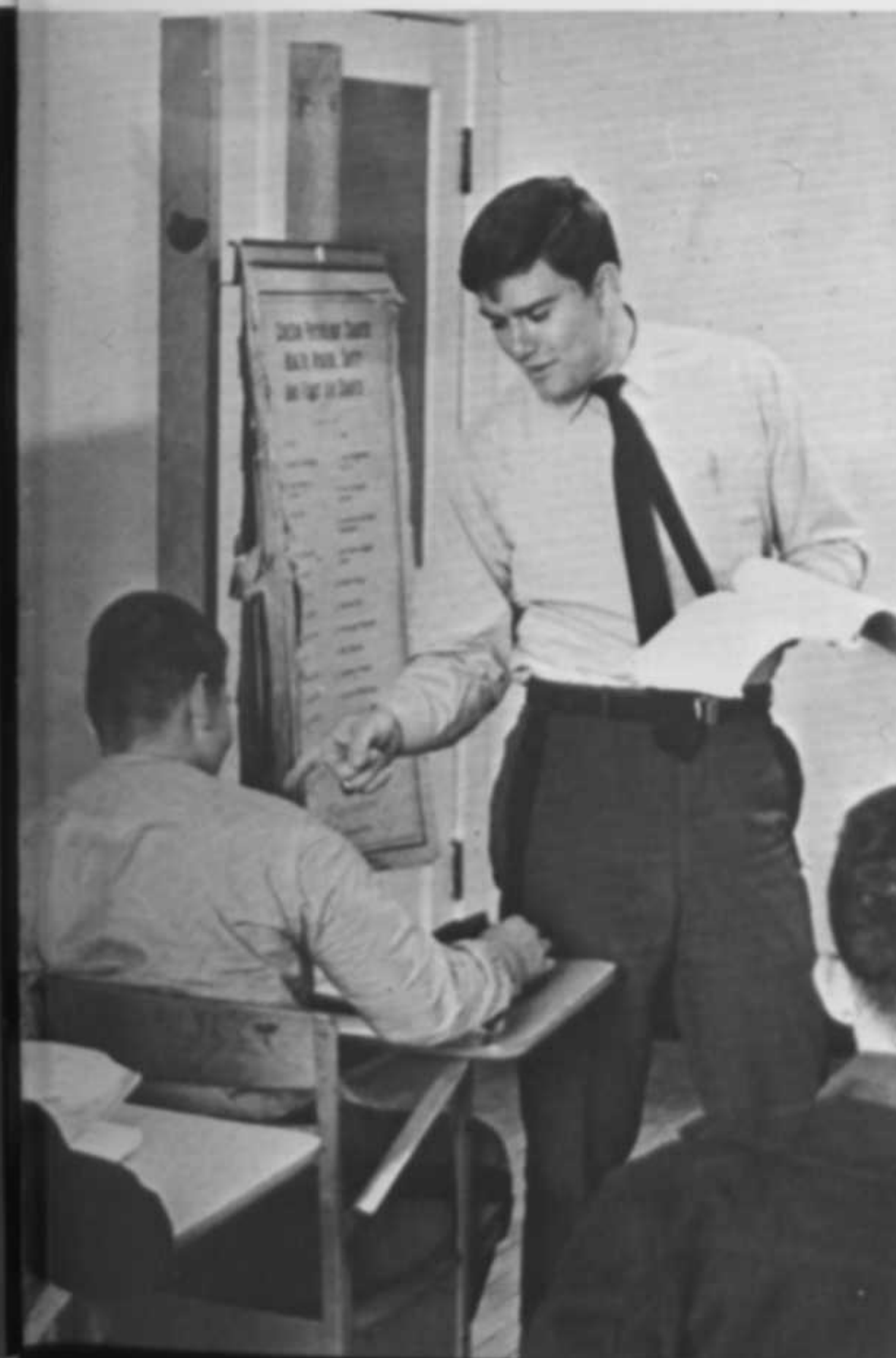

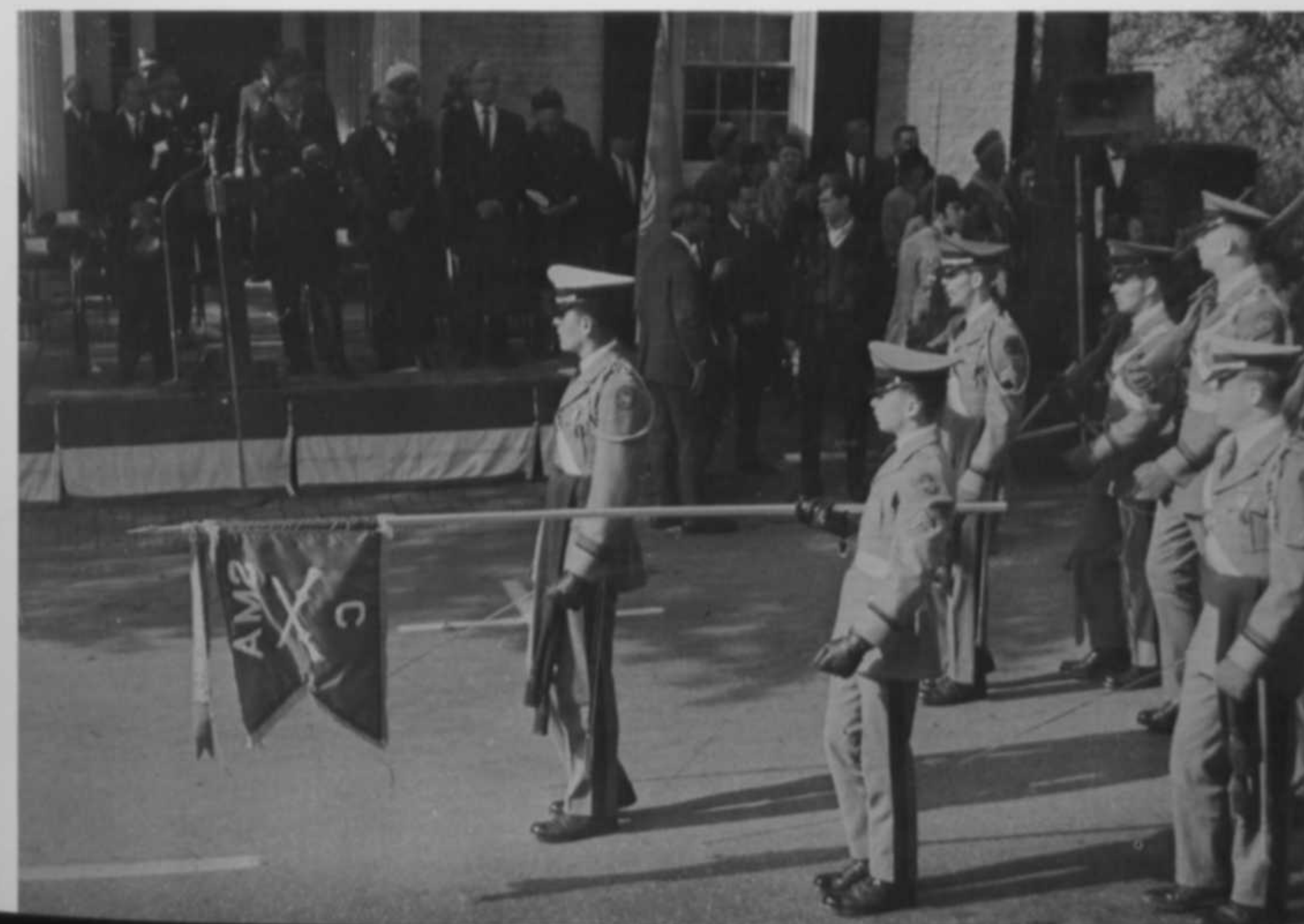

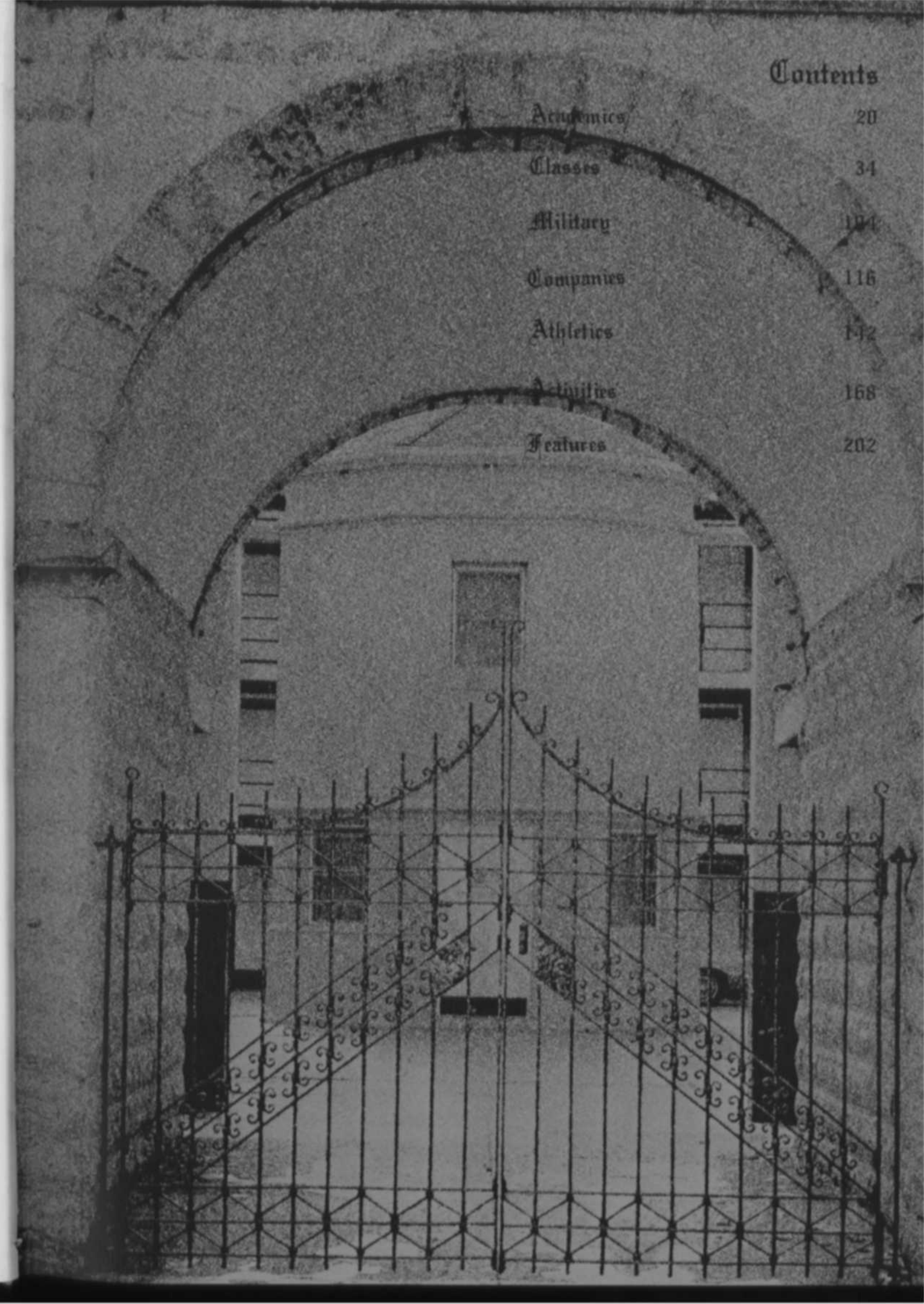
## Dedication

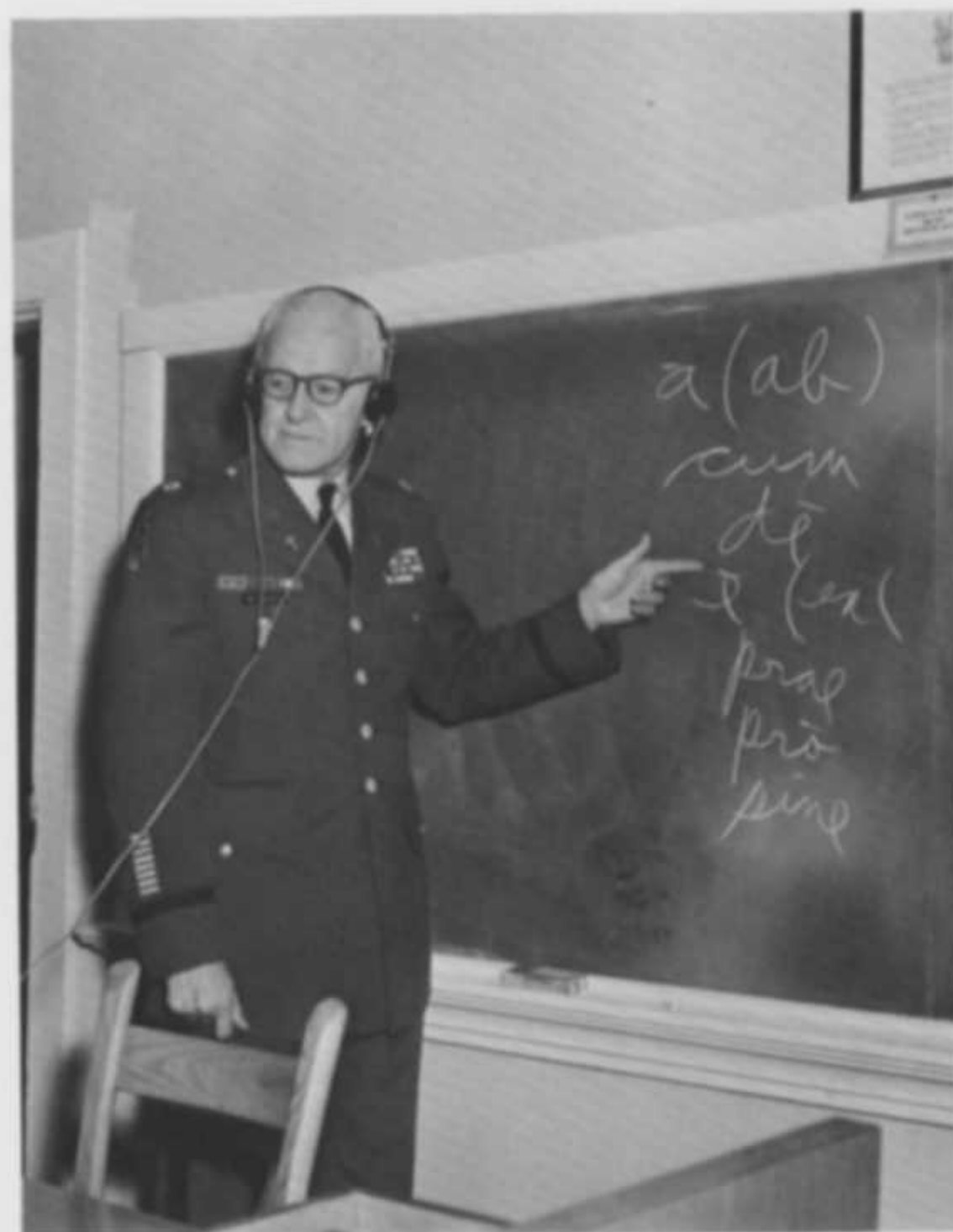


## Foreign Language Department

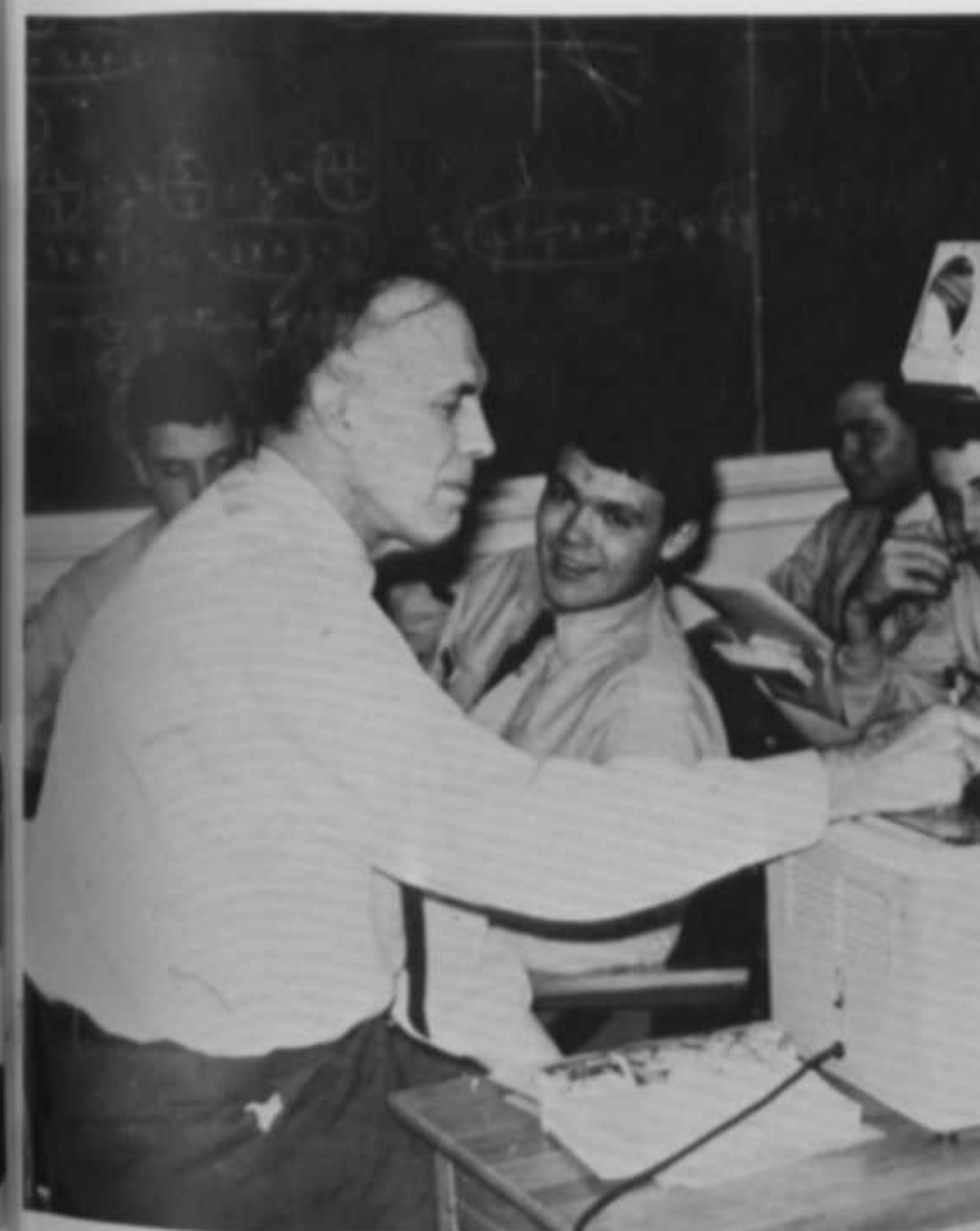

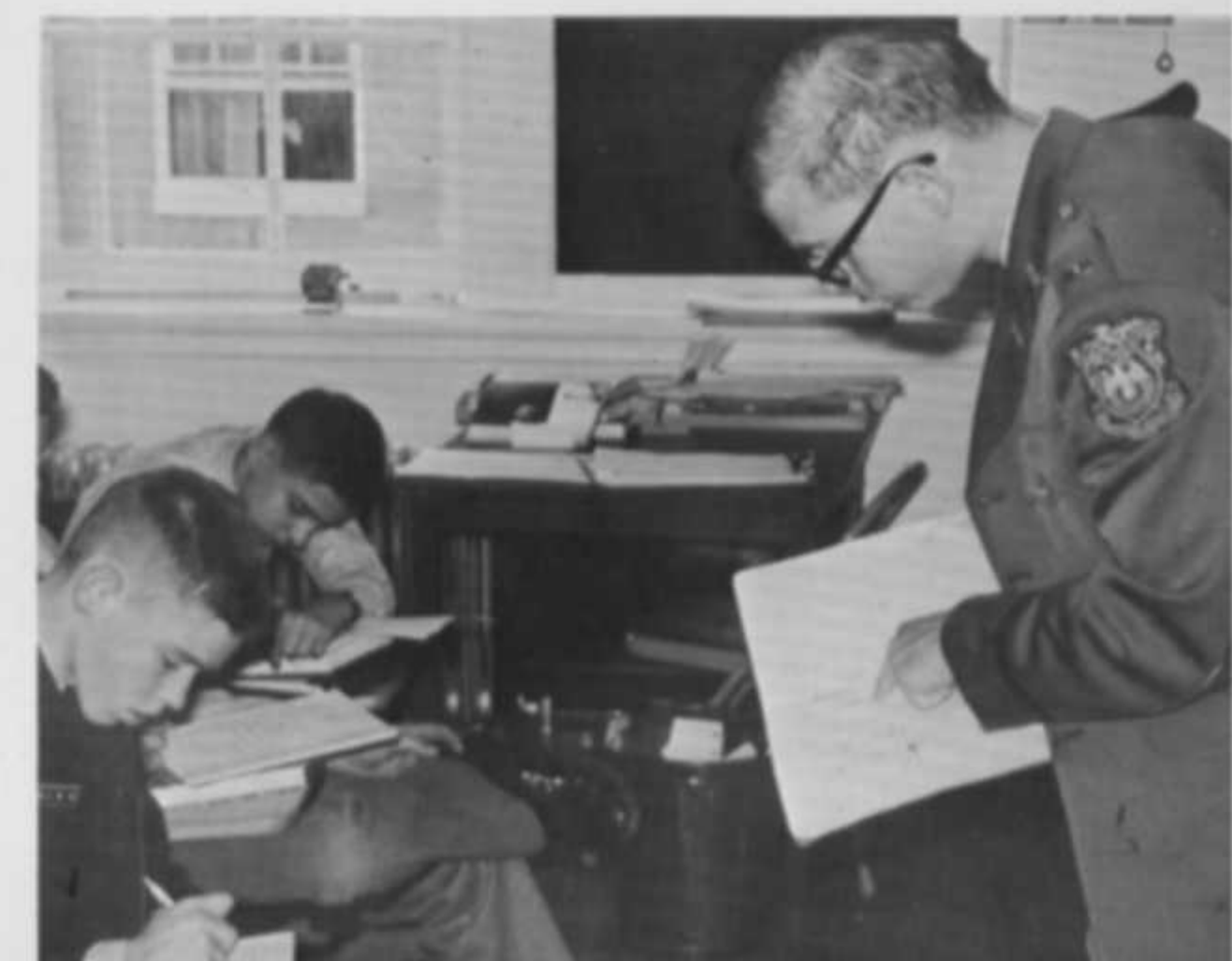

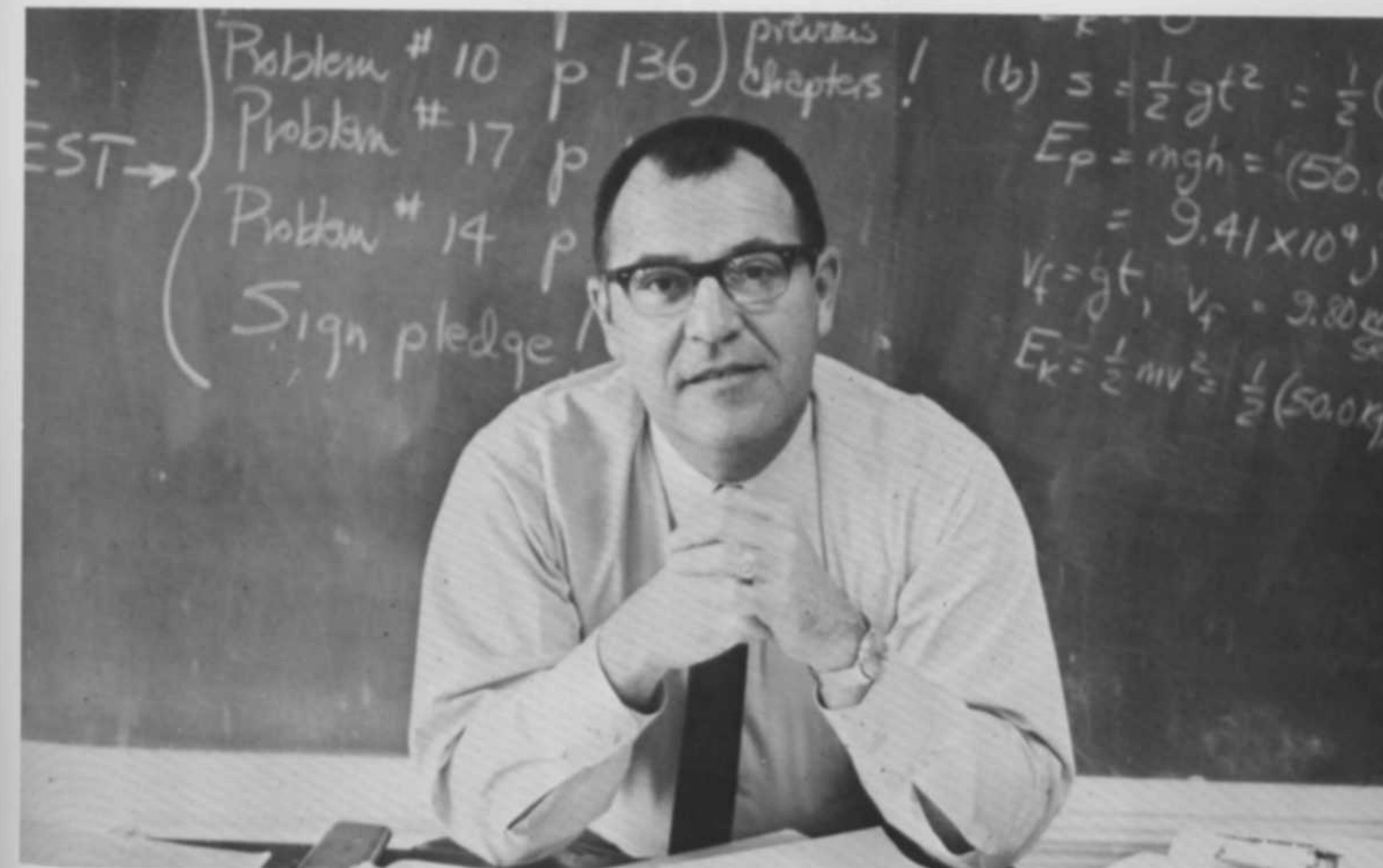

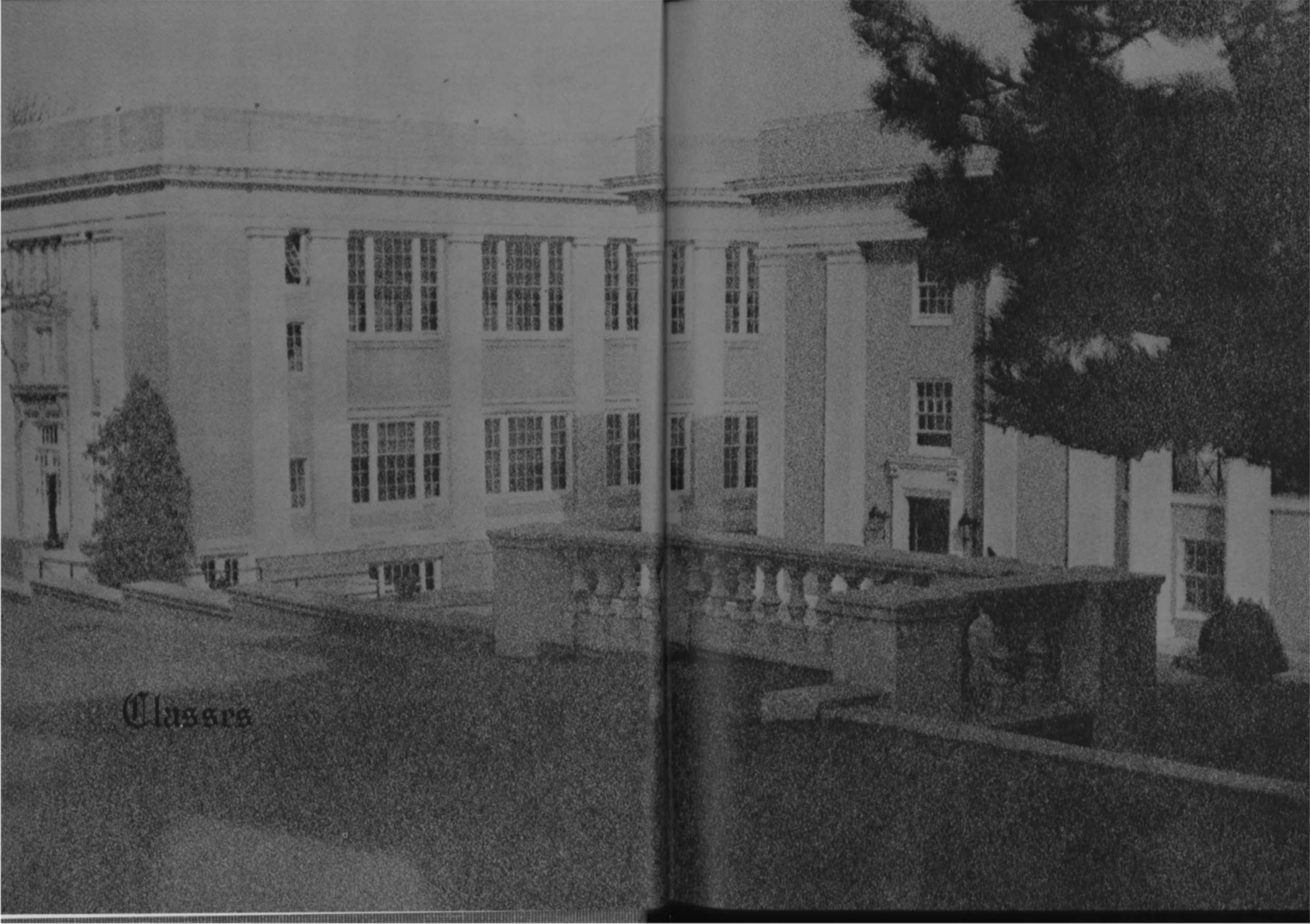

## Guard Duty

Cadet Guard Mount is held each day at 1630 hrs. Earlier times are specified for weekends. The Cadet Guard consists of an Officer of the Day, a SFC or higher, a Sergeant and a Corporal of the Guard. Five orderlies are also selected; from these a gate guard is chosen. It is his responsibility to direct visitors to the office or the person whom they seek. The O.D. carries the overall maintenance of the Guard. It is his responsibility to write up a delinquency sheet at the end of his tour of duty. He is assisted by the Sgt. of the Guard. The Corporal is in charge of delegating the orderlies on such tasks as collecting absentee reports and tracing people for telephone calls. A cadet can expect to pull Guard Duty eight to twelve times during the year.

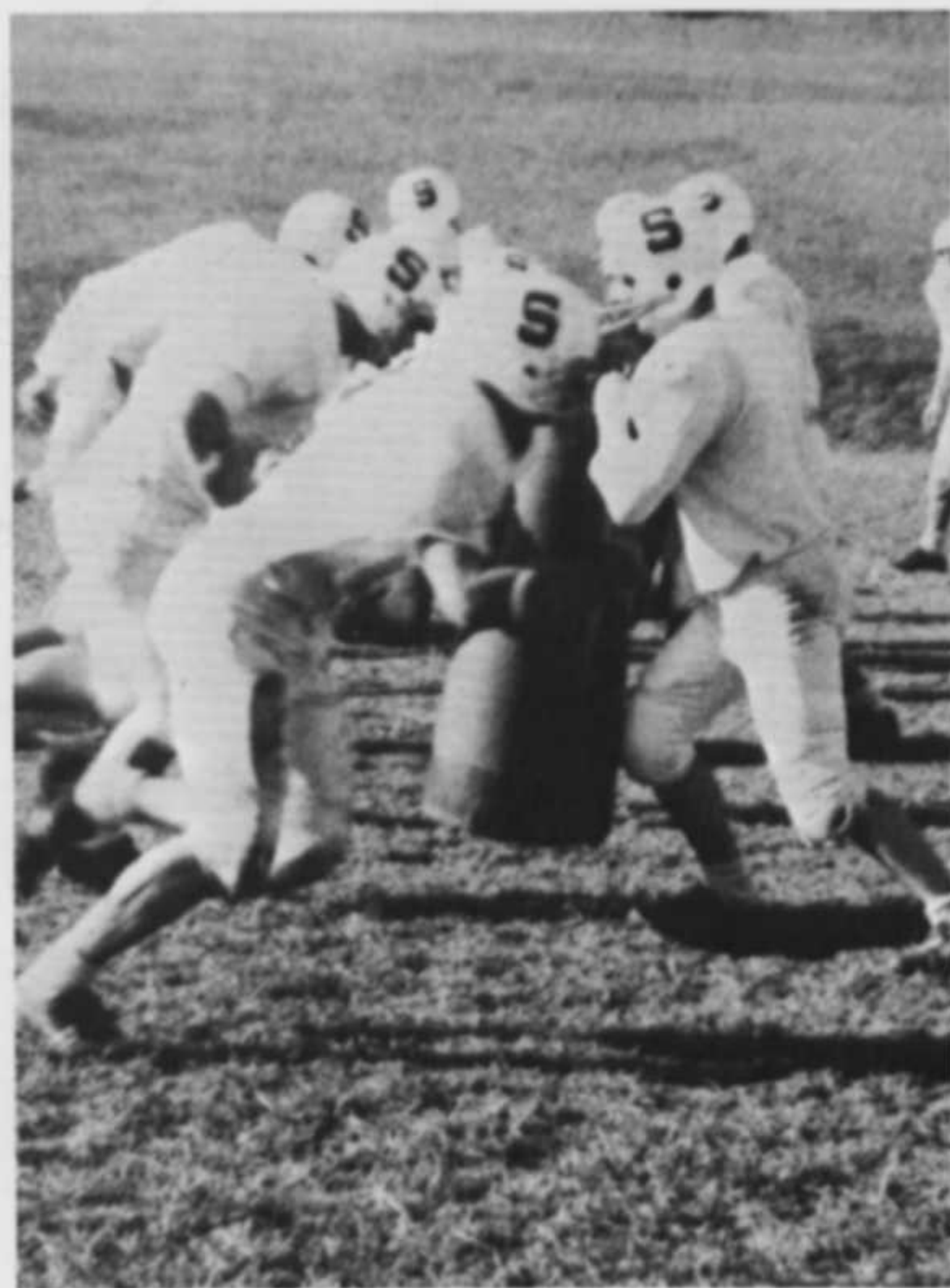

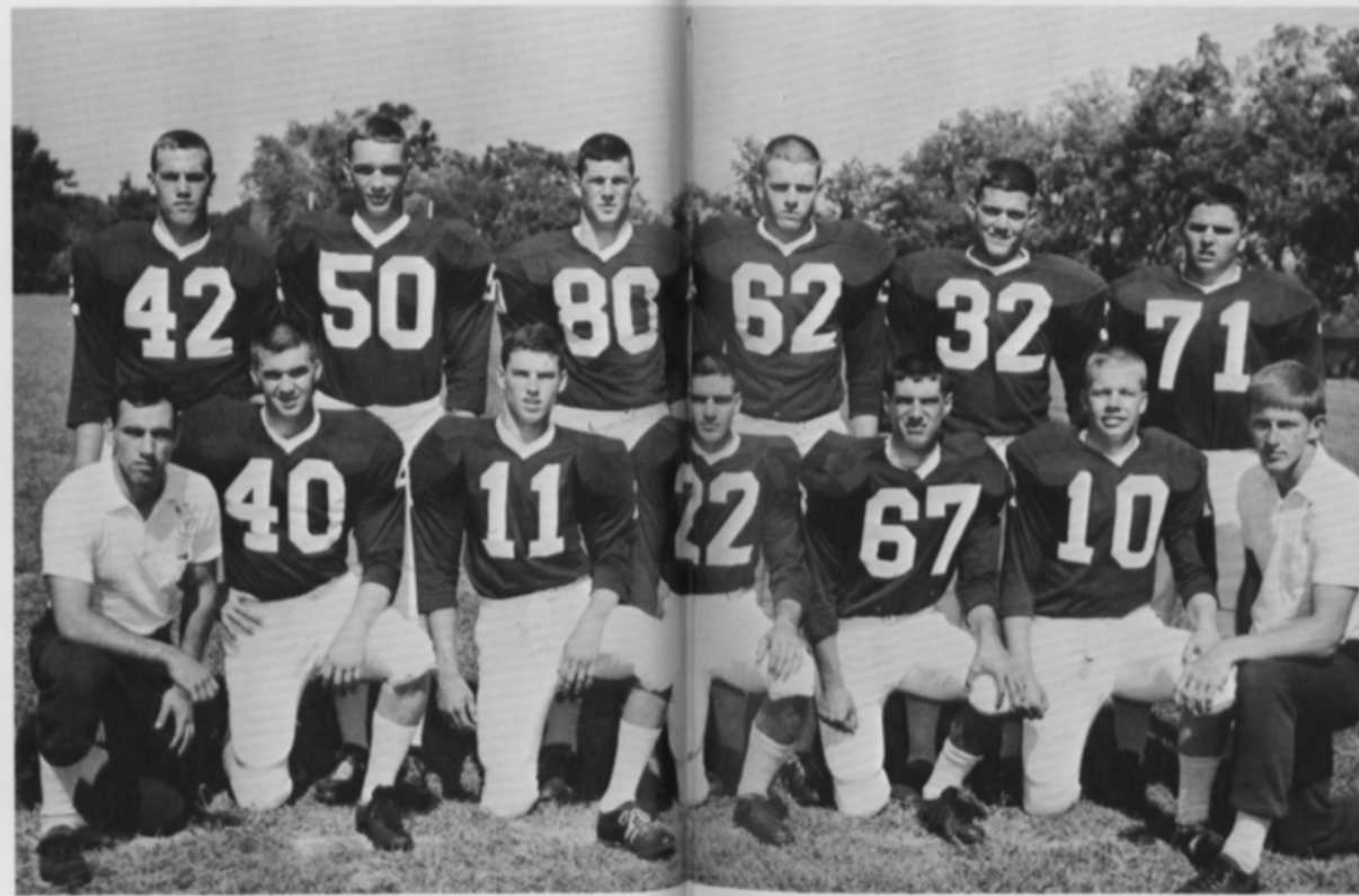

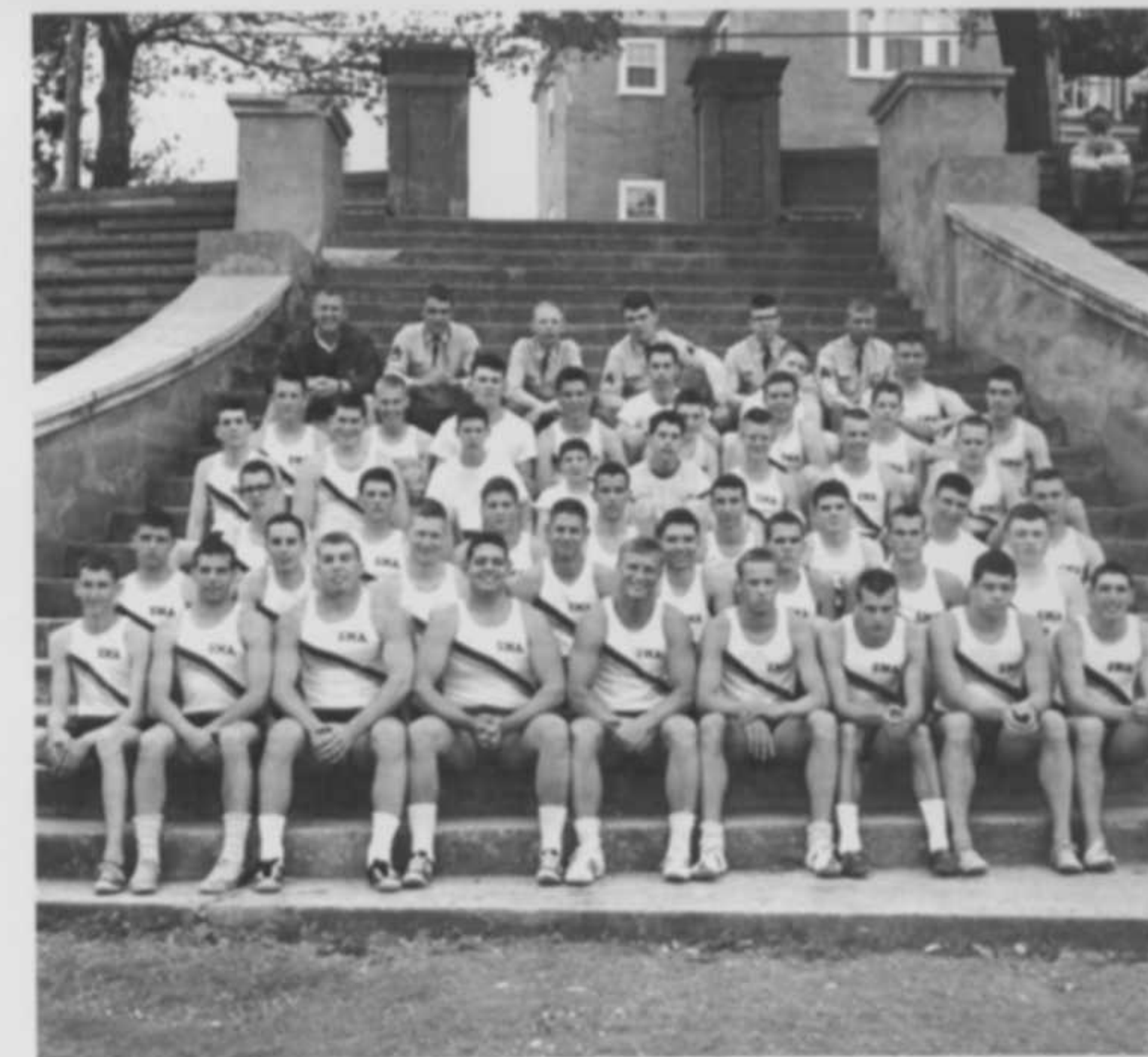

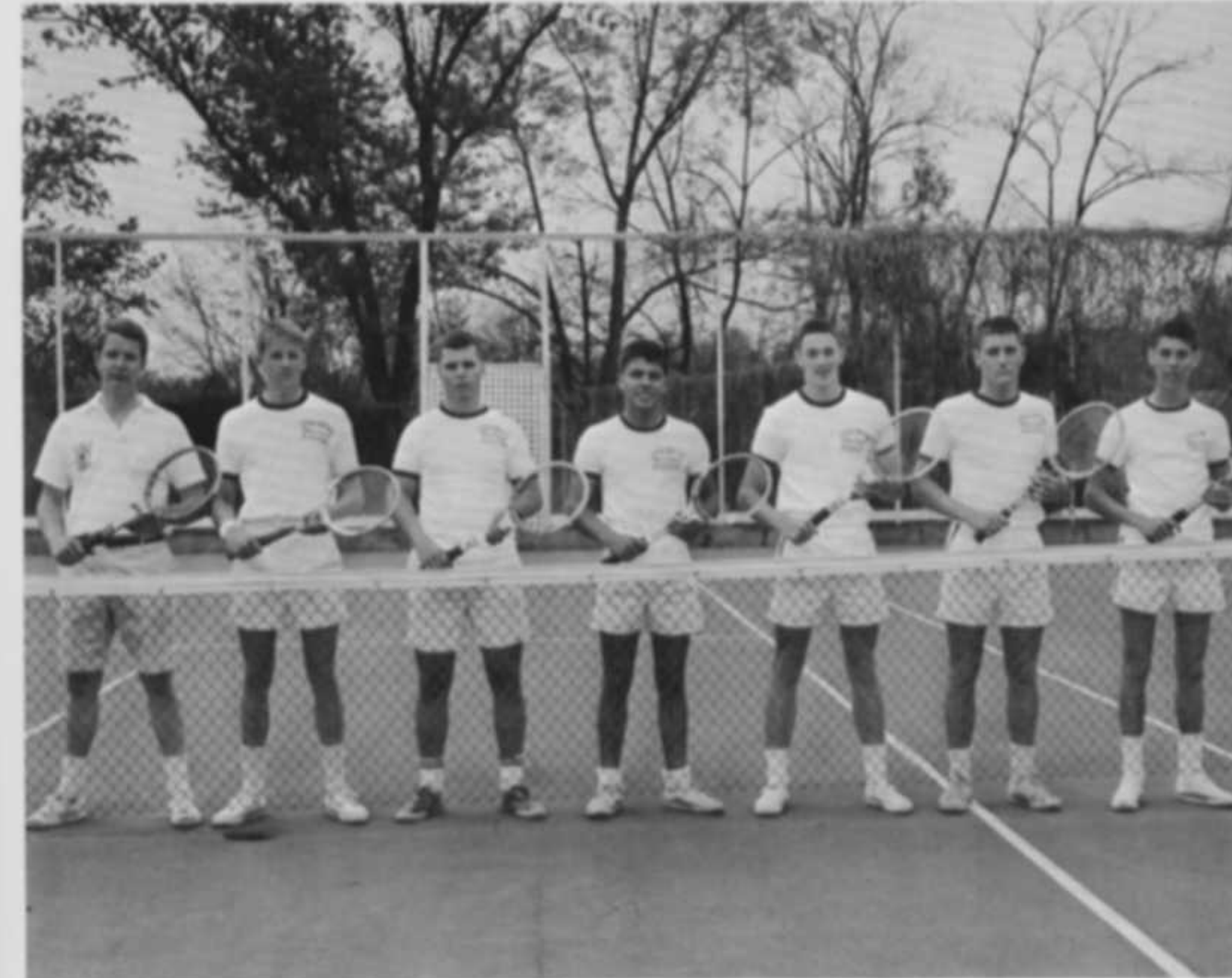

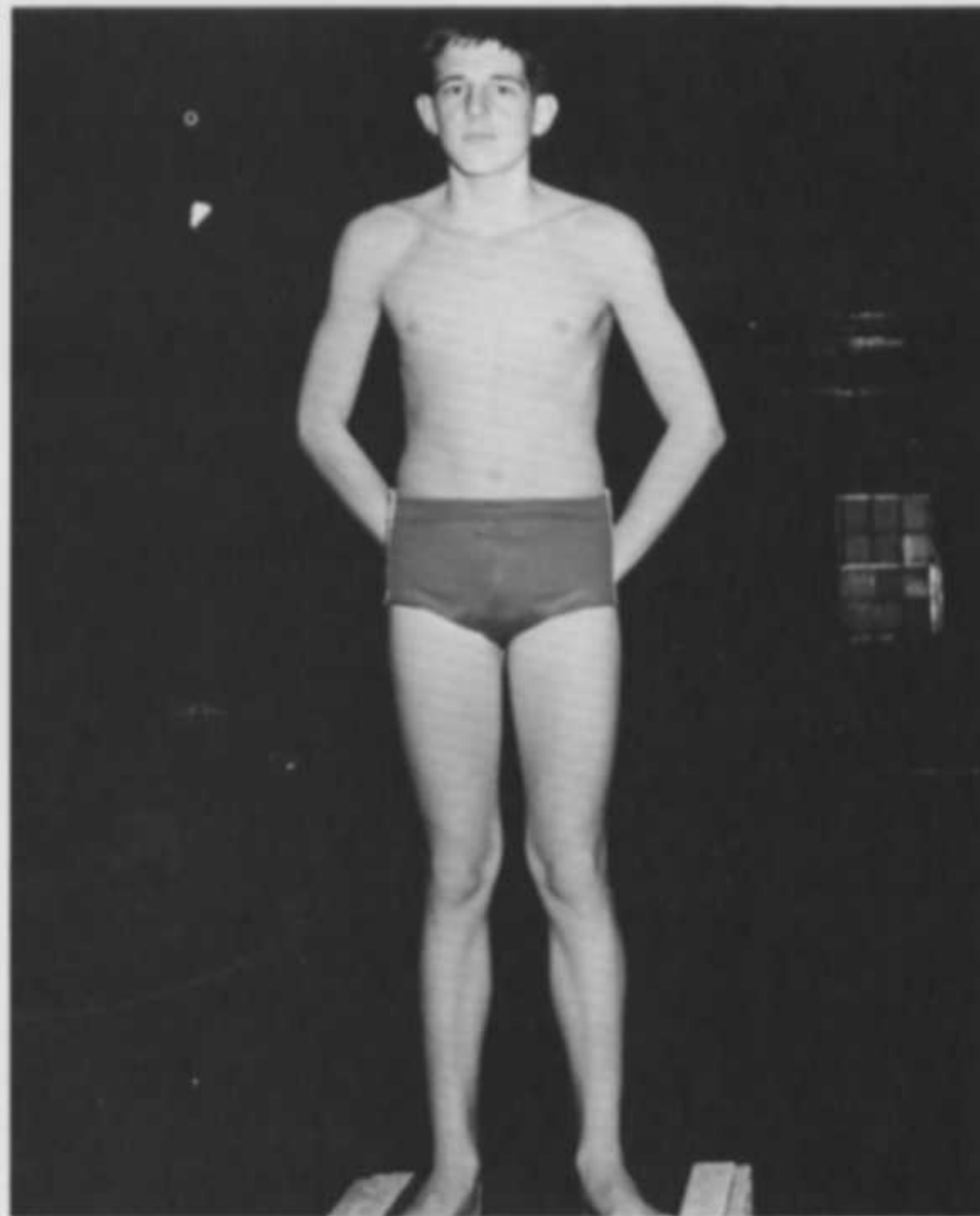

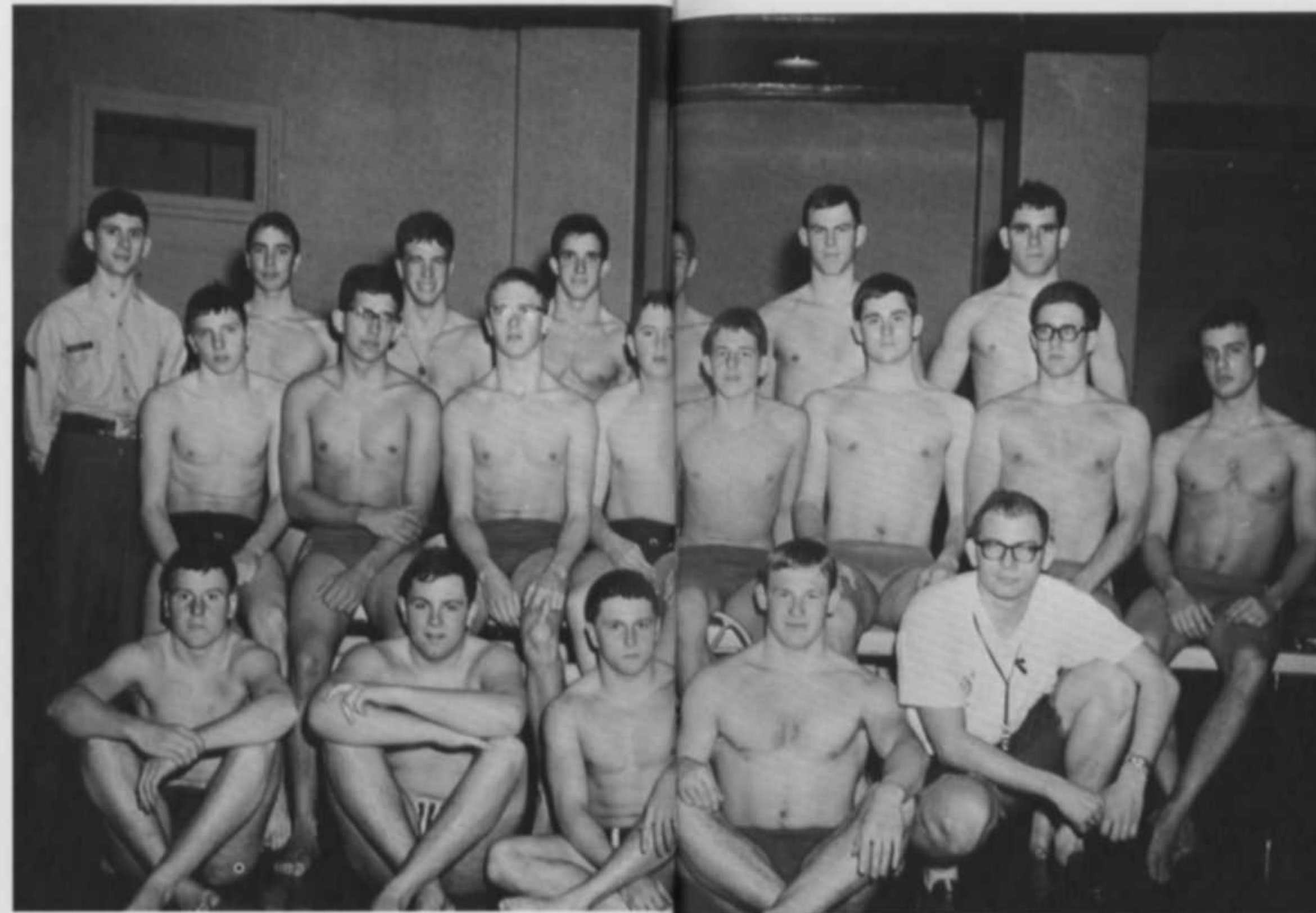

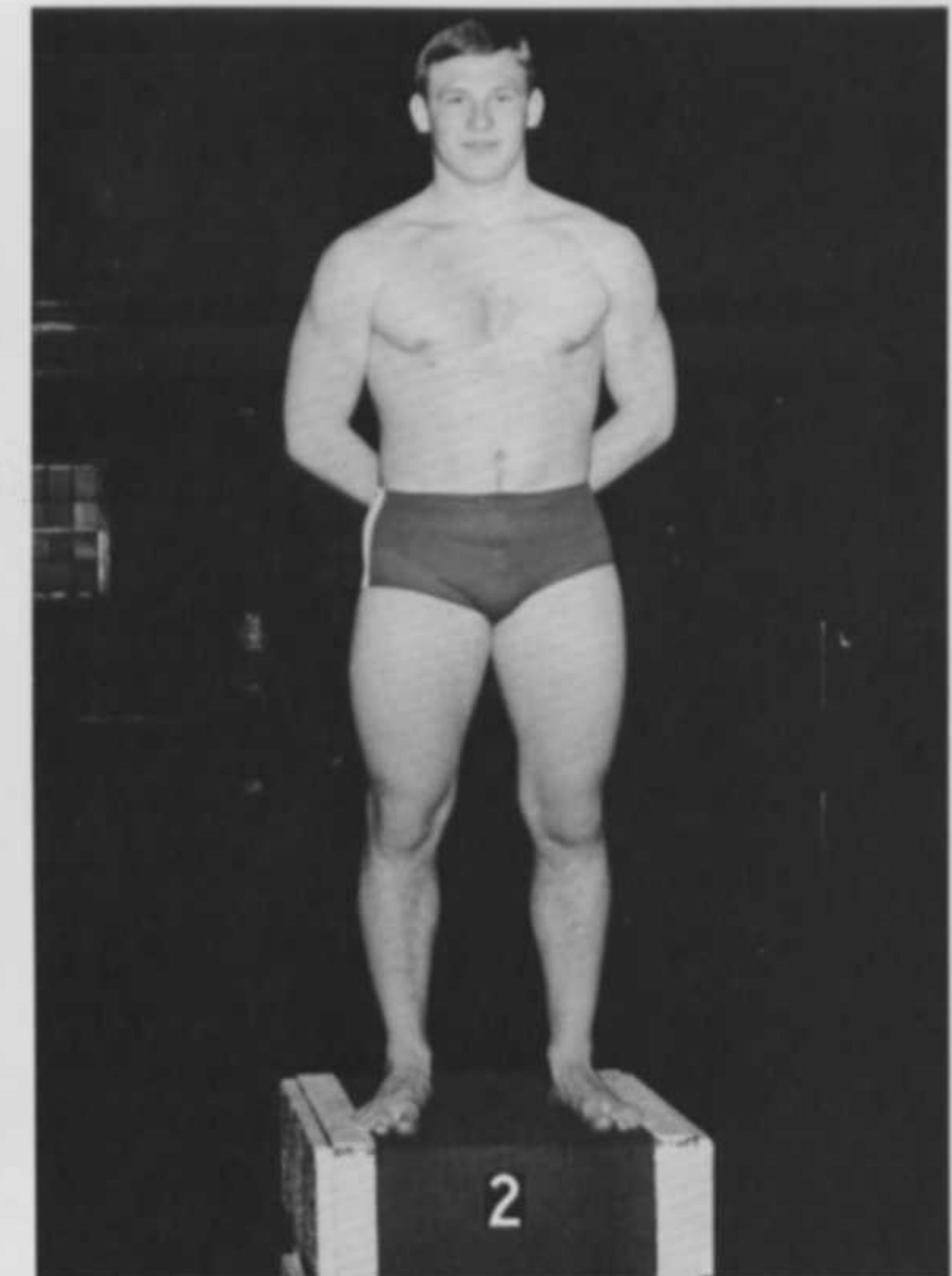

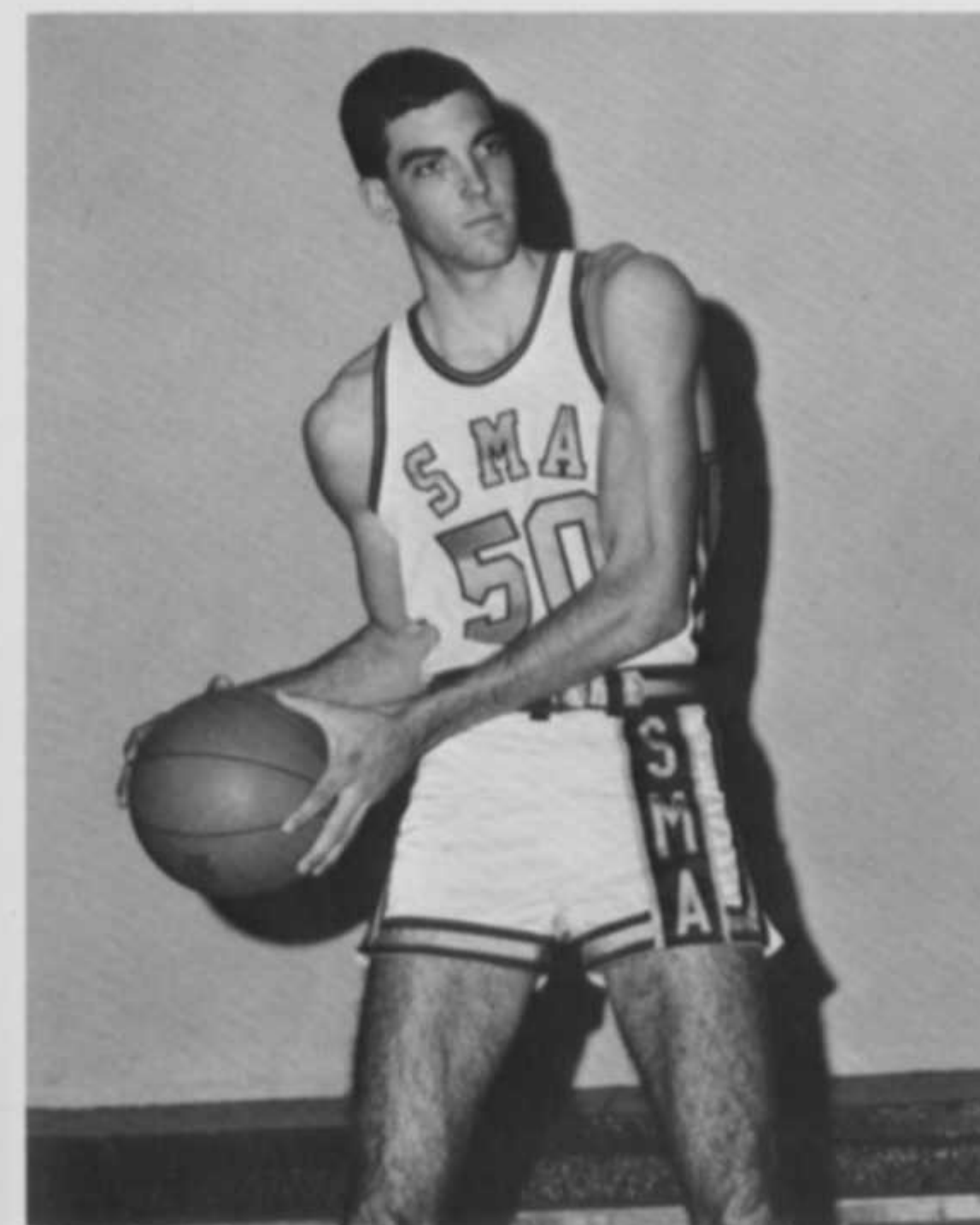

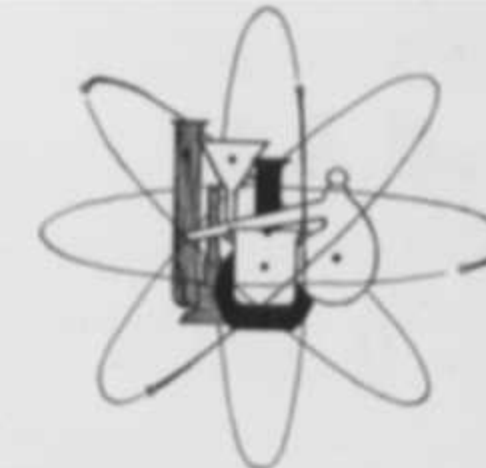

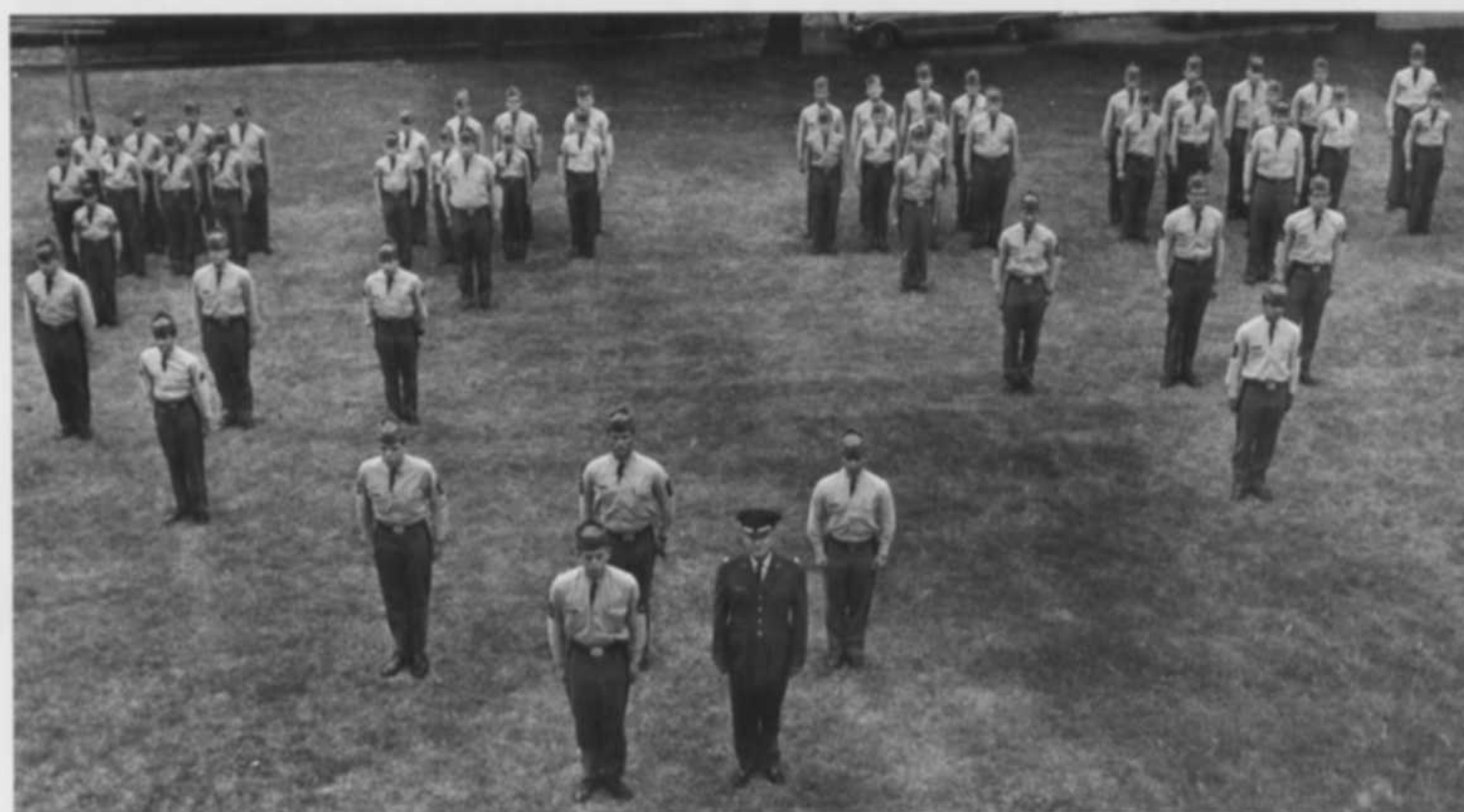

## Intramurals

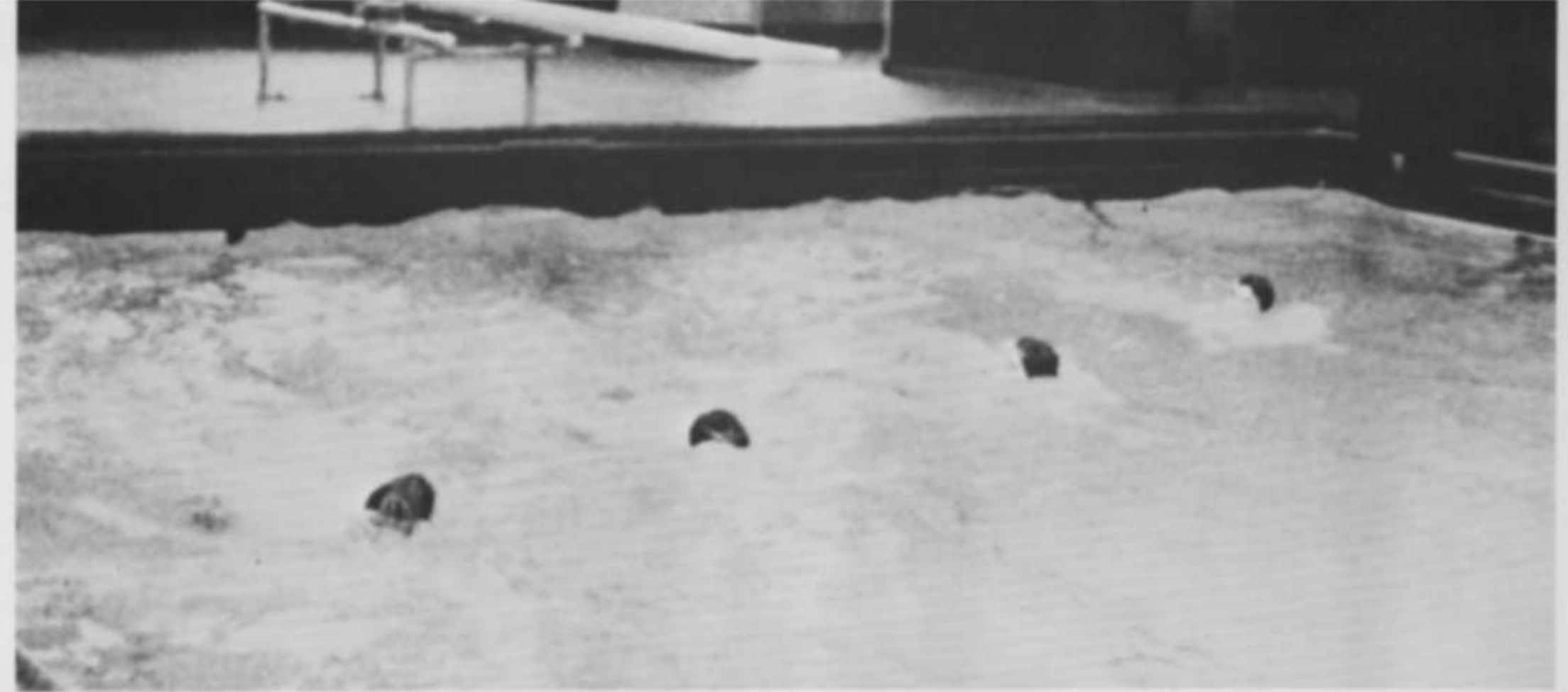
