Plans Handsome Memorial Chapel To Capt. Kable

S. M. A. Y. M. C. A. Secretary Would Perpetuate Founder's Memory.


APPEAL TO ALUMNI OF THE INSTITUTION

Sends Circular to Hundreds of Former Cadets---Many Responses Already---Marble Slab to Perpetuate the Names of all who Contribute Towards the Cause.

Captain James J. King, Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association of the Staunton Military Academy, has issued an appeal to Alumni and Students of the School to subscribe funds for the erection of a Memorial, in the form of a handsome chapel, to Captain William H. Kable, the founder and late Principal of the Institution, and already he has had responses from present and former cadets who have given all the way from one to one hundred dollars towards the project.

We, the Editorial Staff of The Bulletin Board, are hereby showing our appreciation of the subject by giving space and publicity in our columns to a cause so worthy of our consideration and support. And not only this, but we urge every one who has ever been connected with the institution to pledge himself with us in the effort to make possible this desired memorial to our founder.

Captain King conceived the idea of a memorial to Captain Kable shortly after his death, only hesitating to launch the project because of indecision in regard to some suitable form of memorial. Just recently, he decided upon a chapel as most appropriate and during the Chistmas season made his plans. Securing the school records of all registered cadets since the fire destroyed the old barracks, he has communicated his project to nearly



1500 young men through an attractively prepared and beautifully worded circular, and as stated above, results are already being obtained.

No Definite Plans

If the idea meets with the approval of the Academy alumni and present students, and a large enough fund is raised, a building which will forever perpetuate the memory of the founder and honored principal of S. M. A. will be erected, on some spot as yet unchosen.

No definite plans for the chapel have thus far been made, as the project depends entirely on the success of appeal for funds. Capt. King is of the opinion that a fund making possible a very handsome structure, which he proposes to use entirely for religious purposes, will be raised. Together with these plans, it is also proposed that the name of every contributor will be inscribed upon a marble tablet to be placed upon the walls of the said memorial chapel.

Now then, all S. M. A. men, why not answer this long, loud, sincere call? Is it not an opportunity, and have we not a chance to do a commendable deed? If each of us answers the call, then ere the new school year begins, we shall have our chapel, and it will be a lasting monument to every loyal son of S. M. A.

We who knew him and who are still in the service here have thought of nothing so appropriate and so befitting a man of his character and principles than that a "Memorial Chapel" be raised to perpetuate his memory. William H. Kable Memorial Chapel, which is to grace and to give tone to every phase of our cadet life.

To this end, every cadet and every friend who has come within the influence of our departed Senior Captain is given this opportunity to show his interest in this project; and it is hoped that out of the great rank and file of those to whom this privilege is given, that your name will appear among those upon our records as one who has contributed liberally towards this worthy cause.
