

To the Corps of '47 we present THE SHRAPNEL.







BRIGADIER GENERAL EARL McFARLAND, B.S., M.E.
D.S.M.—Legion of Merit
U. S. Army Retired
Superintendent

General McFarland, a native Kansan, is a graduate of the United States Military Academy, West Point. Later he graduated from a number of army colleges including Command and General Staff School, Army Industrial College, and Army War College. A distinguished army career included services in foreign lands, academic duty at West Point, the War Department, and twice Commanding Officer at Springfield Armory. Currently General McFarland was the recipient of the Legion of Merit citation for "exceptionally meritorius and outstanding service as Commanding officer of the Springfield Armory in World War II in an enormous expansion program....that affected substantial savings in man-power and money and directly hastened the date of final victory."

The General is author of widely used textbooks and also was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal during World War I.

September, 1943, General McFarland became Superintendent of Staunton Military Academy.

Colonel Pence was born at Quicksburg, Shenandoah County Virginia. He was awarded the B.A. degree from Roanoke College and the M.A. degree from Columbia University and pursued additional graduate work at the University of Chicago and the University of Virgina.

He was an instructor in a rural school in his native county in 1912 and 1913, and from 1916 to 1919 the Colonel served as principal of two high schools in the same county. After this he came to Staunton Military Academy as an instructor in mathematics, and in 1939 was made acting-headmaster, until the following year when he was promoted to Headmaster.

Colonel Jones is a native of Pennsylvania, an alumnus of several colleges, an officer in the Army, and now Treasurer and Business Manager of Staunton Military Academy.

Commissioned a first lieutenant in World War I, Colonel Jones spent the past thirty years at various army stations performing important work at each, attending different war department schools of advanced education and assuming greater and greater responsibilities with each year. World War II found him ready to assume responsibilities for the unprecedented jobs which the Army then undertook and carried through to victory.

Colonel Jones' service from 1942 to the close of the War brought him under the leading commanders both in the European Theatre and at home; for his noteworthy service he was awarded the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, French Legion of Honor, and the Croix de Guerre with palm. Colorado State College in 1915 with M.E. degree. Colonel Strock was commissioned Captain, Infantry, U. S. Army and served during World War I. Subsequent assignments found him detailed to Hawaii, the General Staff, Reserve Officers' Training Corps, and military academies. During this time Colonel Strock was graduated from the Infantry School and from Command and General Staff School.

After service in the European theatre in the early stages of World War II, Colonel Strock was selected for the important position of P. M. S. and T. at Staunton Military Academy by Major General Philip Hayes, commanding general, Third Service Command.

At the time of his retirement from the Army in 1946, Colonel Strock was appointed Commandant of Cadets.

An alumnus of Staunton Military Academy and a native Virginian, Colonel Enslow returned to his Alma Mater the beginning of the school session to take over the duties of Professor of Military Science and Tactics.

After his graduation from West Point in 1923, Colonel Enslow joined the regular Army where he saw considerable service in the China-Burma-India Theatre under General Joseph Stilwell, during World War II. Colonel Enslow's experiences were many and varied in this area where, for eighteen months, he was in command of all American forces at the China-Indo China front. For his outstanding work Colonel Enslow received numerous Chinese decorations and was awarded the Legion of Merit by our government for "exceptionally meritorious service."


"Ted"


"Pete"

Highlights of the season were two victories over Woodberry Forest, State Prep School Champions, and a gratifying 5-4 win over George Washington High of Danville, State High School champions.


