

It is with this goal in mind that the Academic Staff has always striven and has never been hindered by success in recognizing and aiding in the development of these traits.



The Howie Rifles have the specific function of showing off the high caliber of drill which is performed during the year.


This organization perpetuates, the courage, ideals, and leadership exemplified by Major Thomas Howie, who was killed in action at St. Lo in July of 1944.

The Co-Captains of this year's team were guard, Bill Colon, and fullback, Al Smith, who were co-captains of last year's squad.


The team was under the able coaches, Diviney and Murray, who were new to the staff this year. Though the team was not too successful this year our coaches are optomistic in their outlock for next year.

We were defeated by one point in the final seconds of play by a strong Hargrave Military Academy quintet, and, as a consequence, lost the State Championship.


