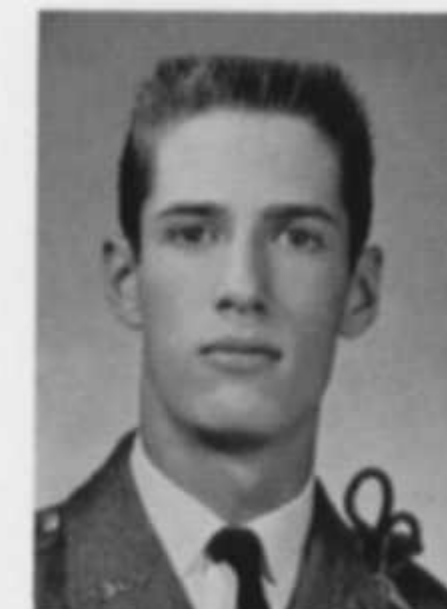

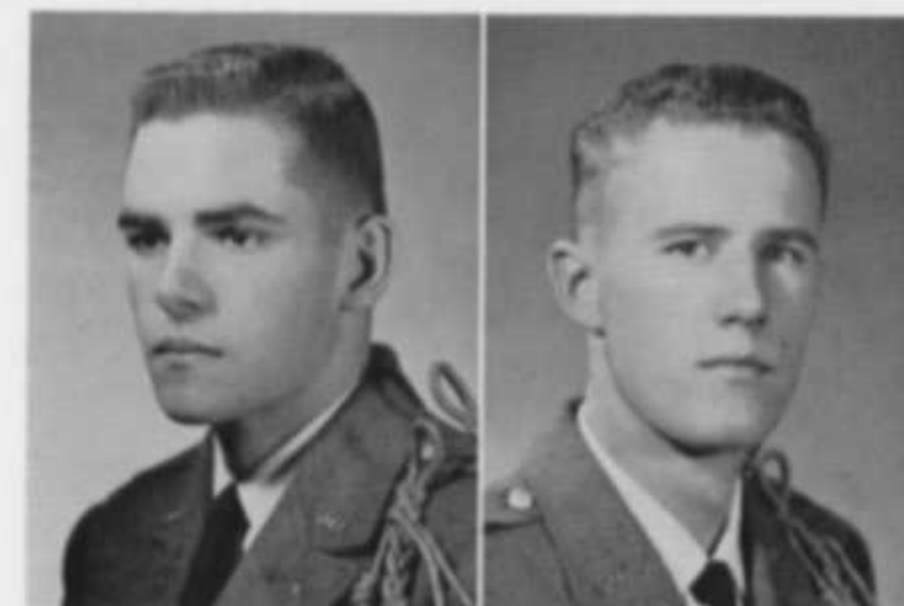

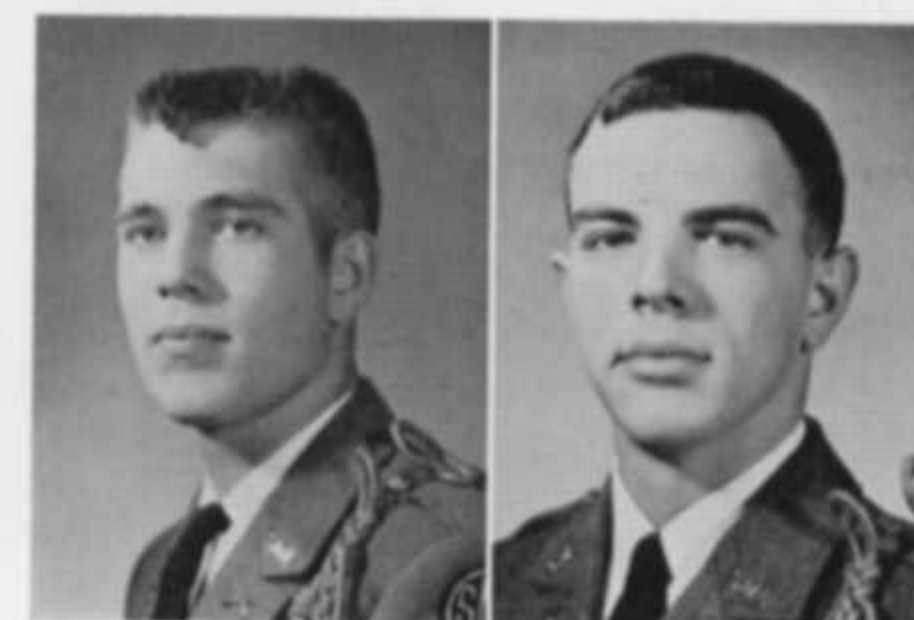

AUTUMN DAYBREAK

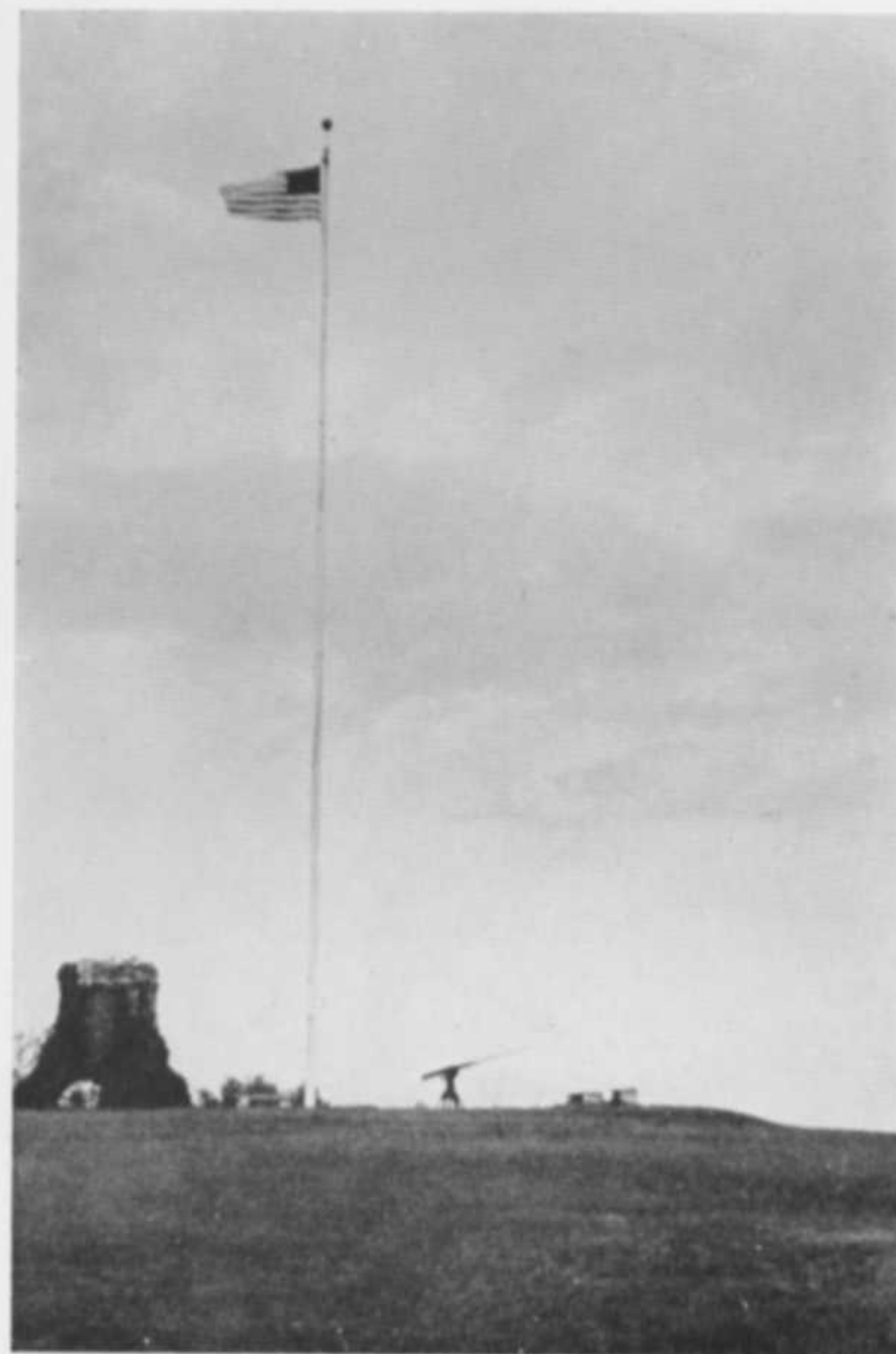
Cold wind of autumn, blowing loud

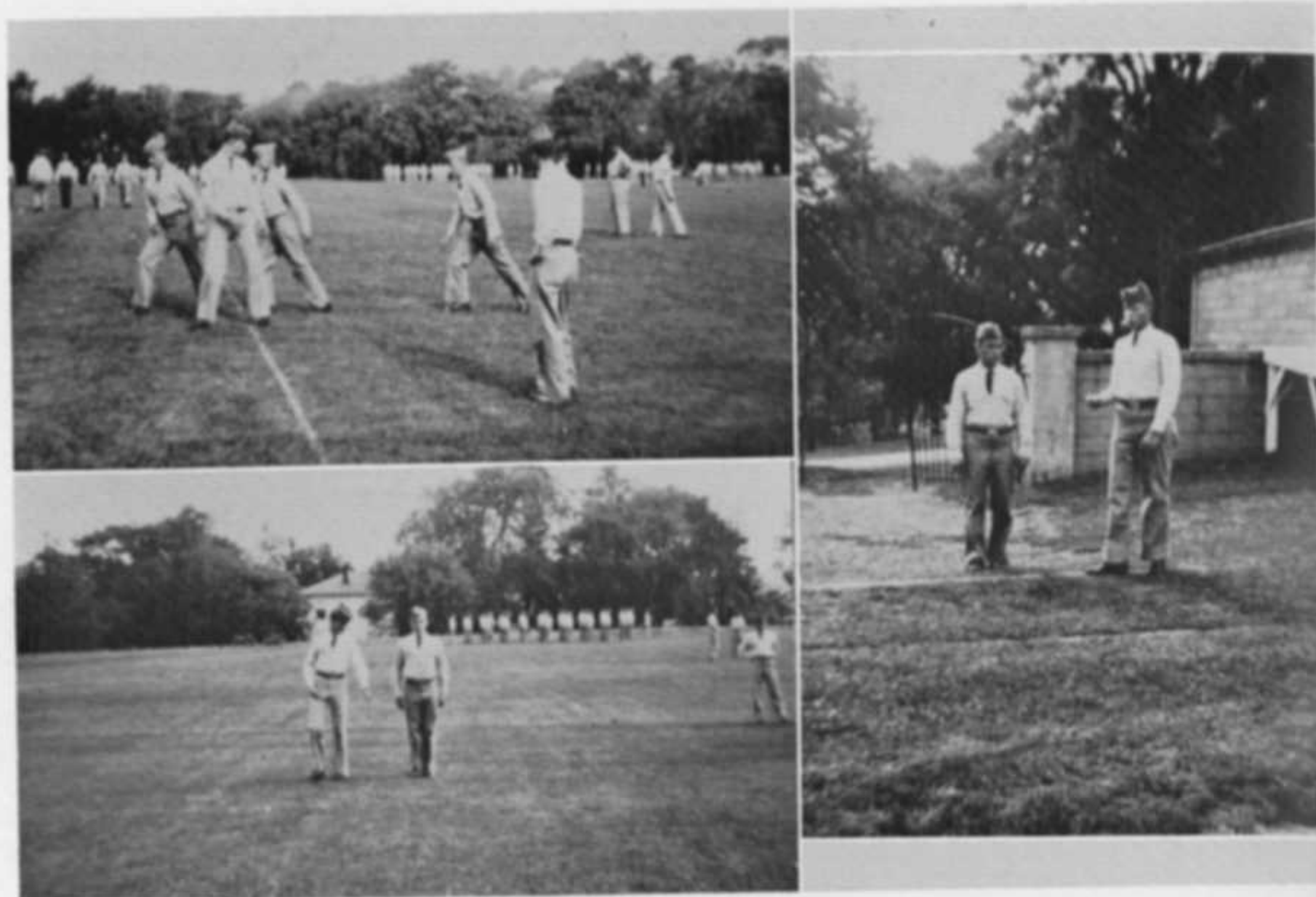

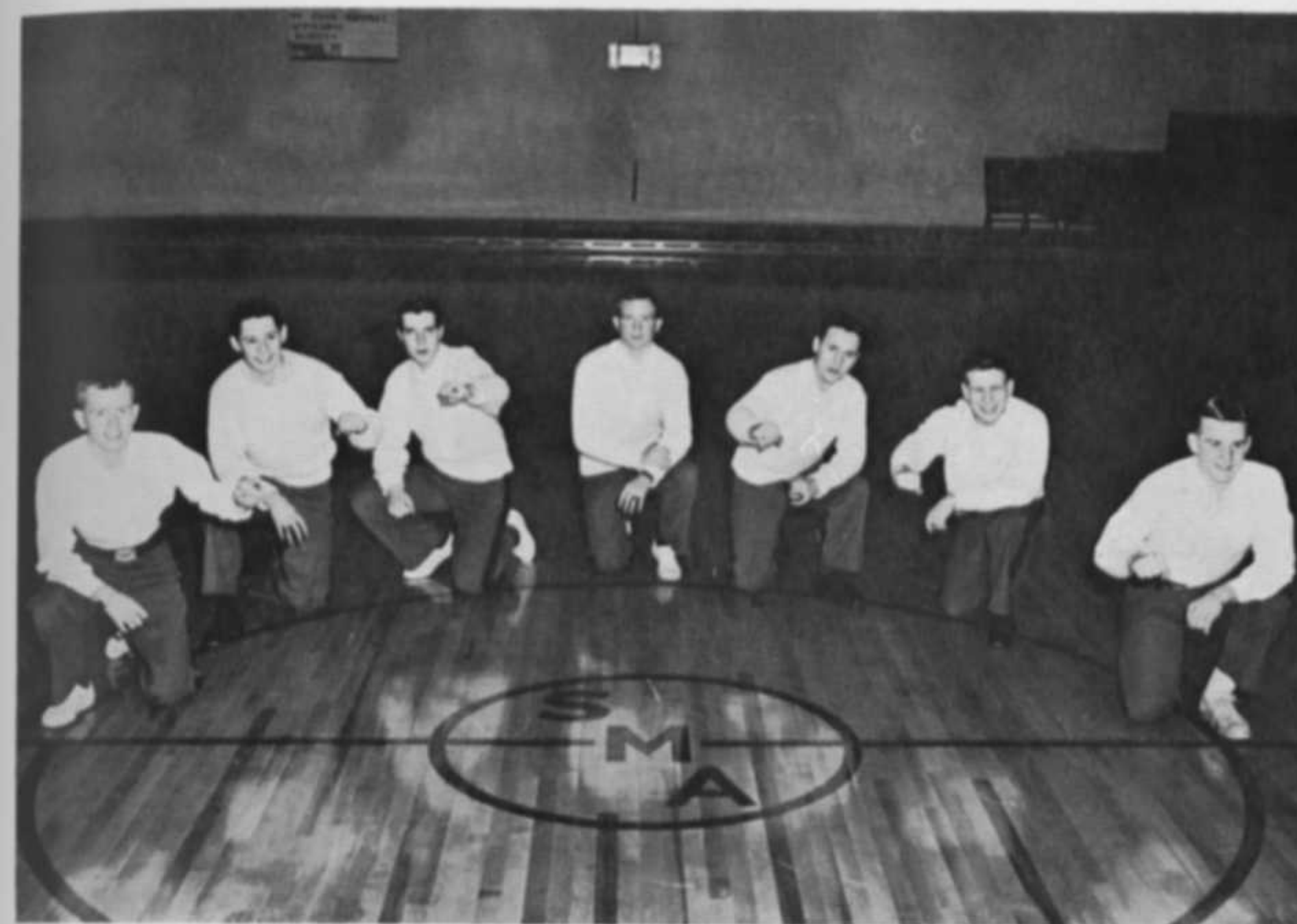


Malogrides tackled after gain by pass.

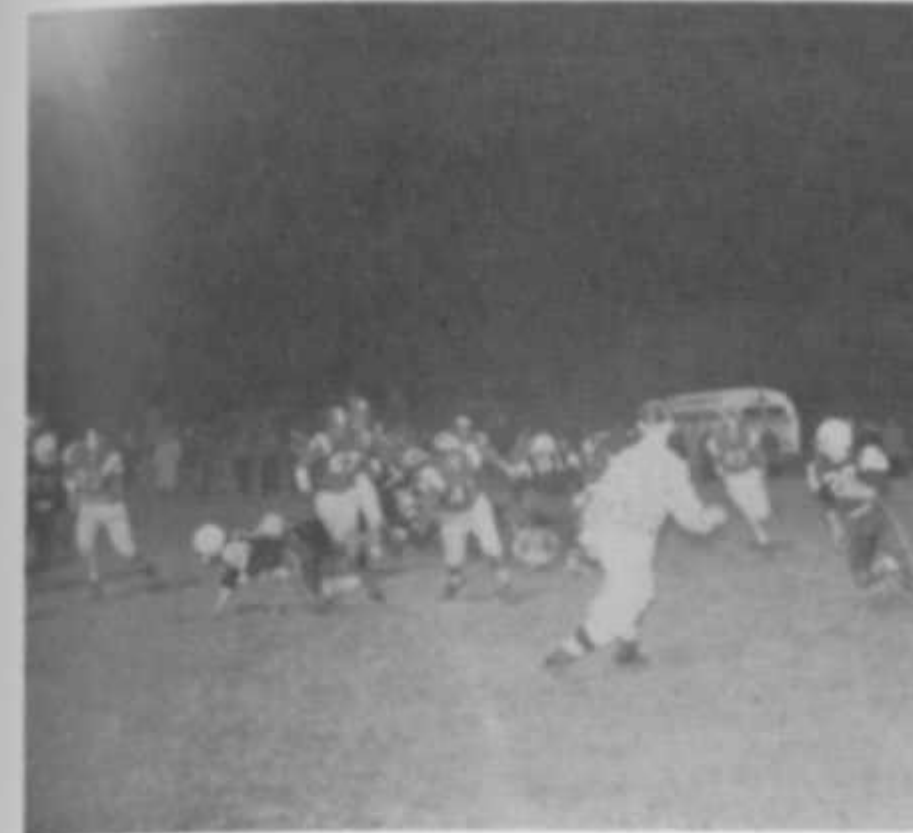

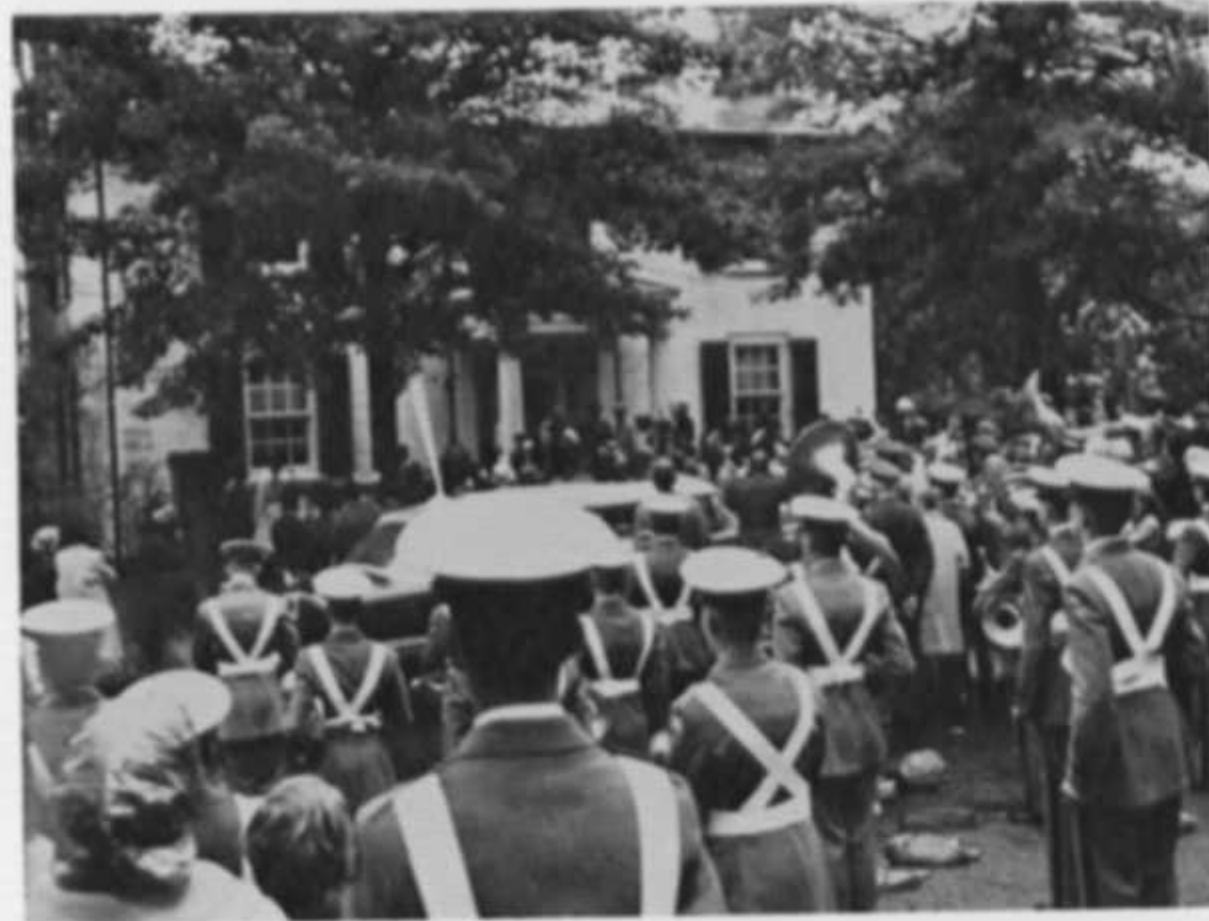

VETERANS' DAY

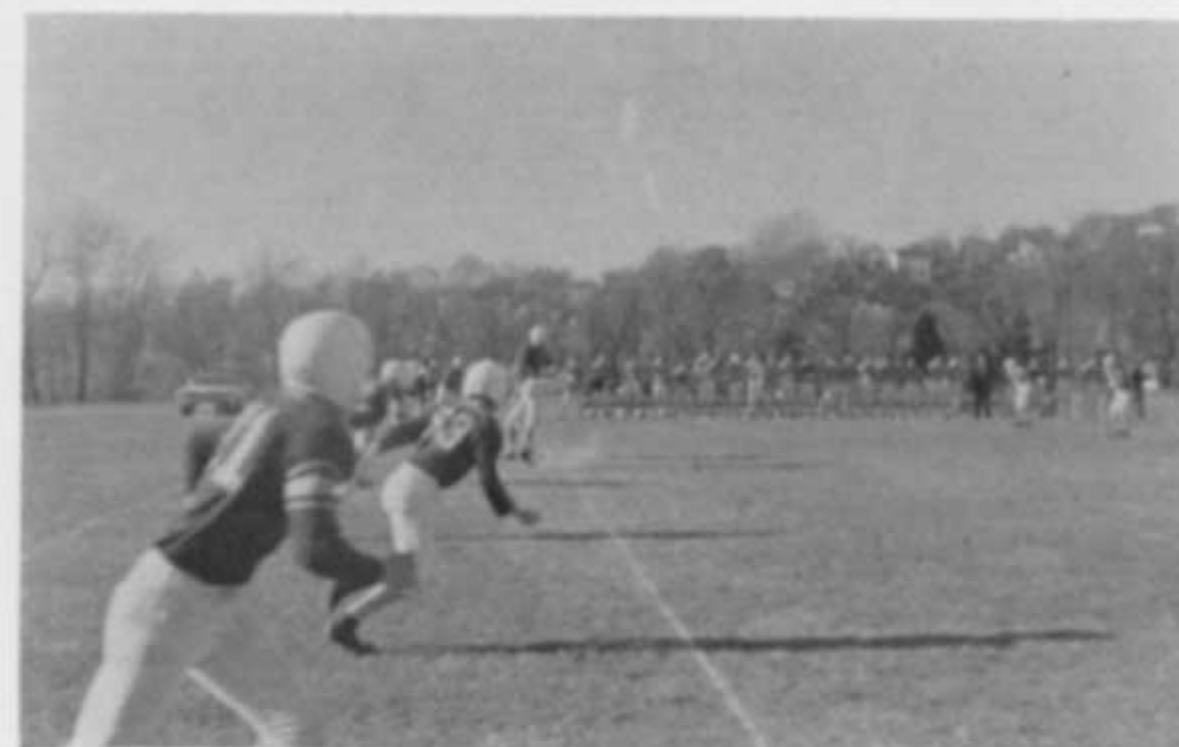
11 November 1960

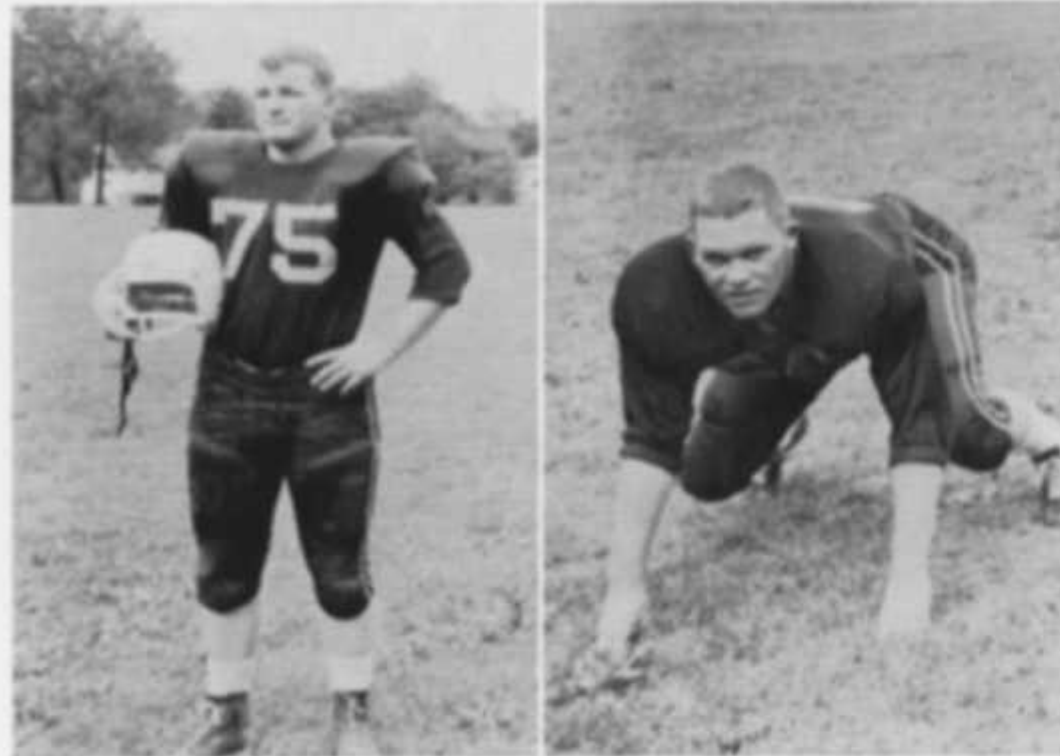

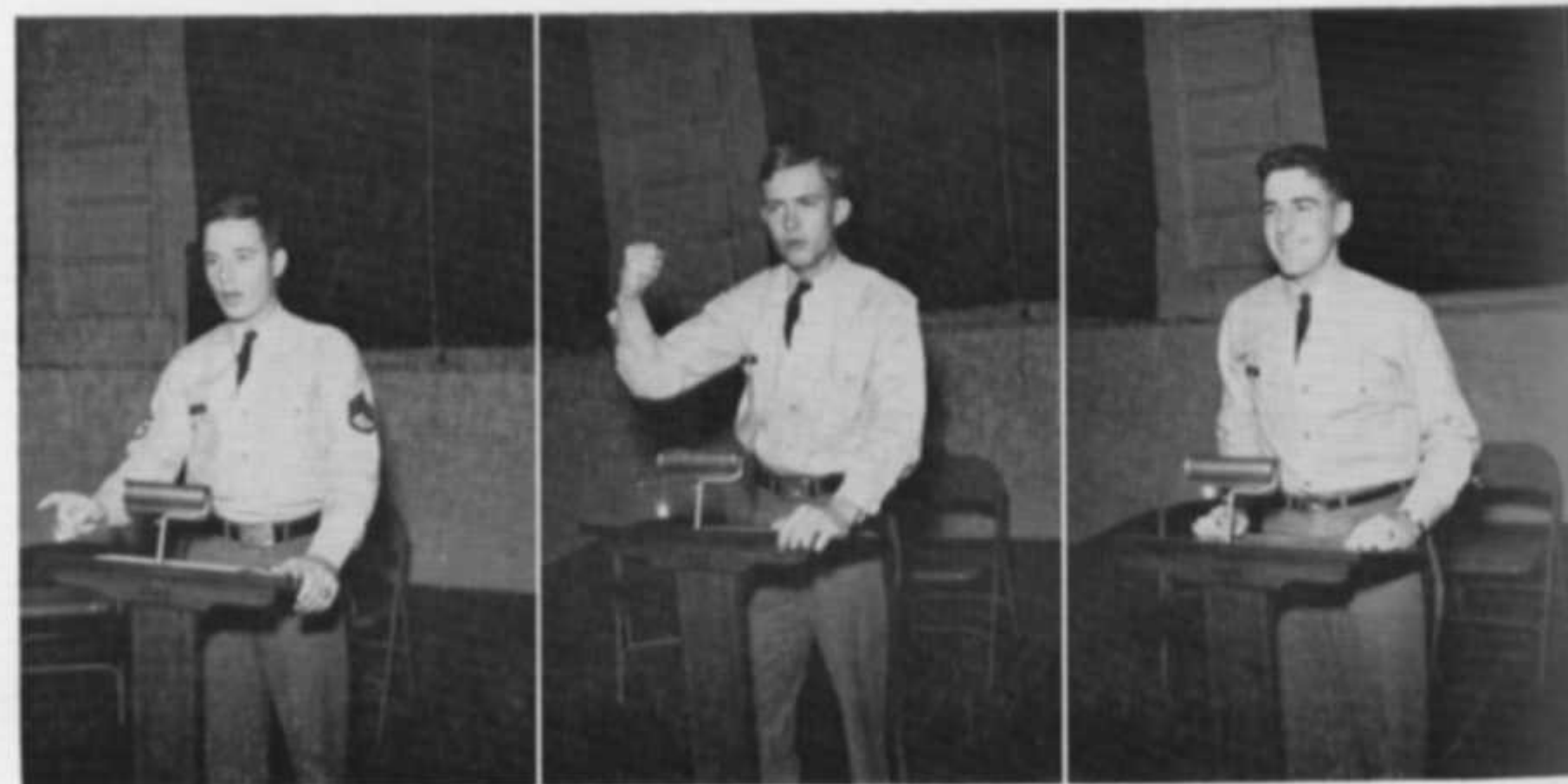
SPEECH CONTEST

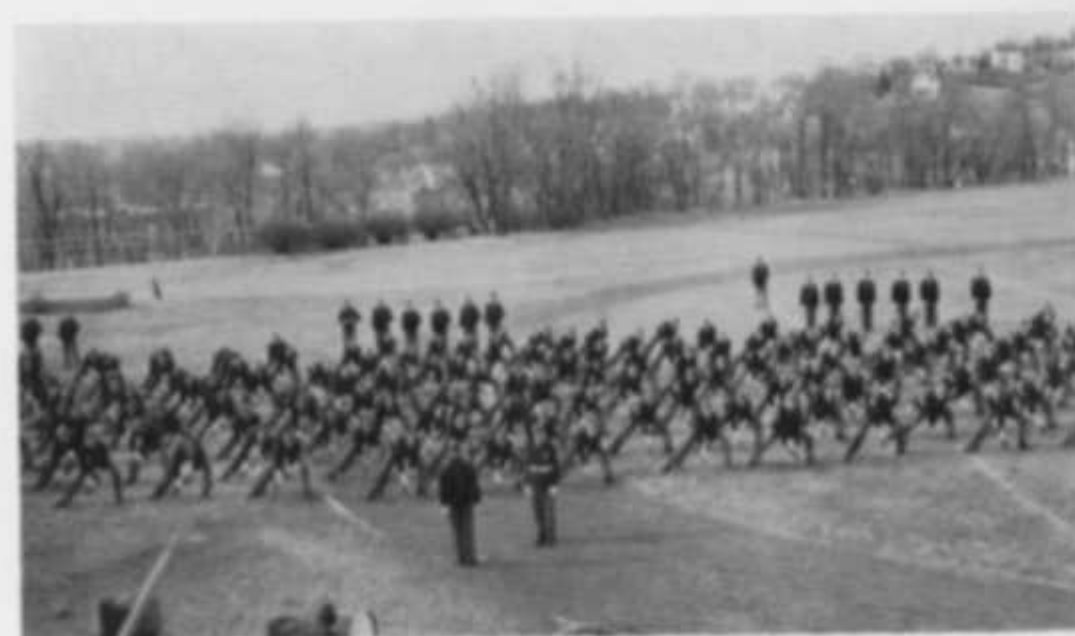

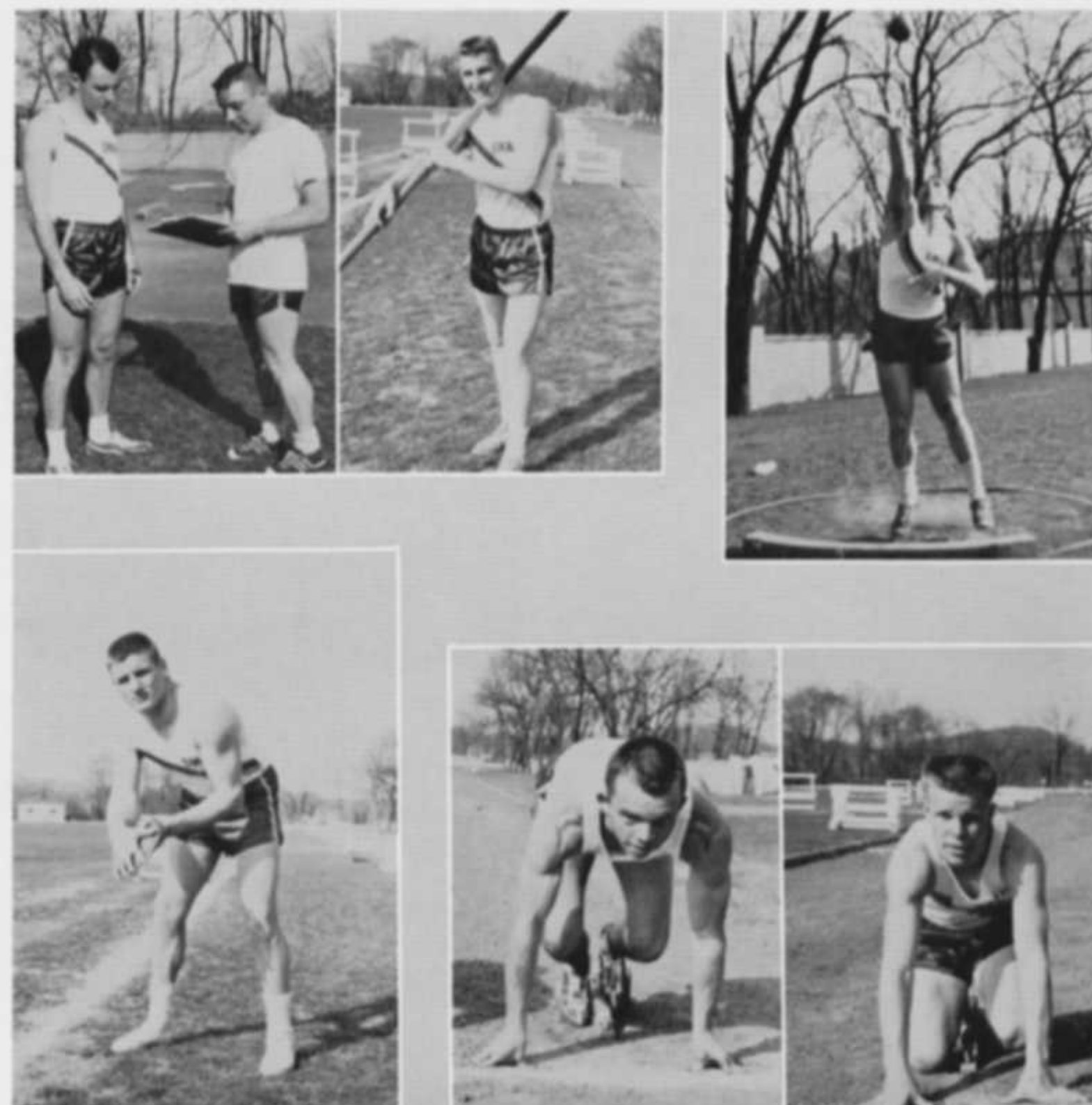

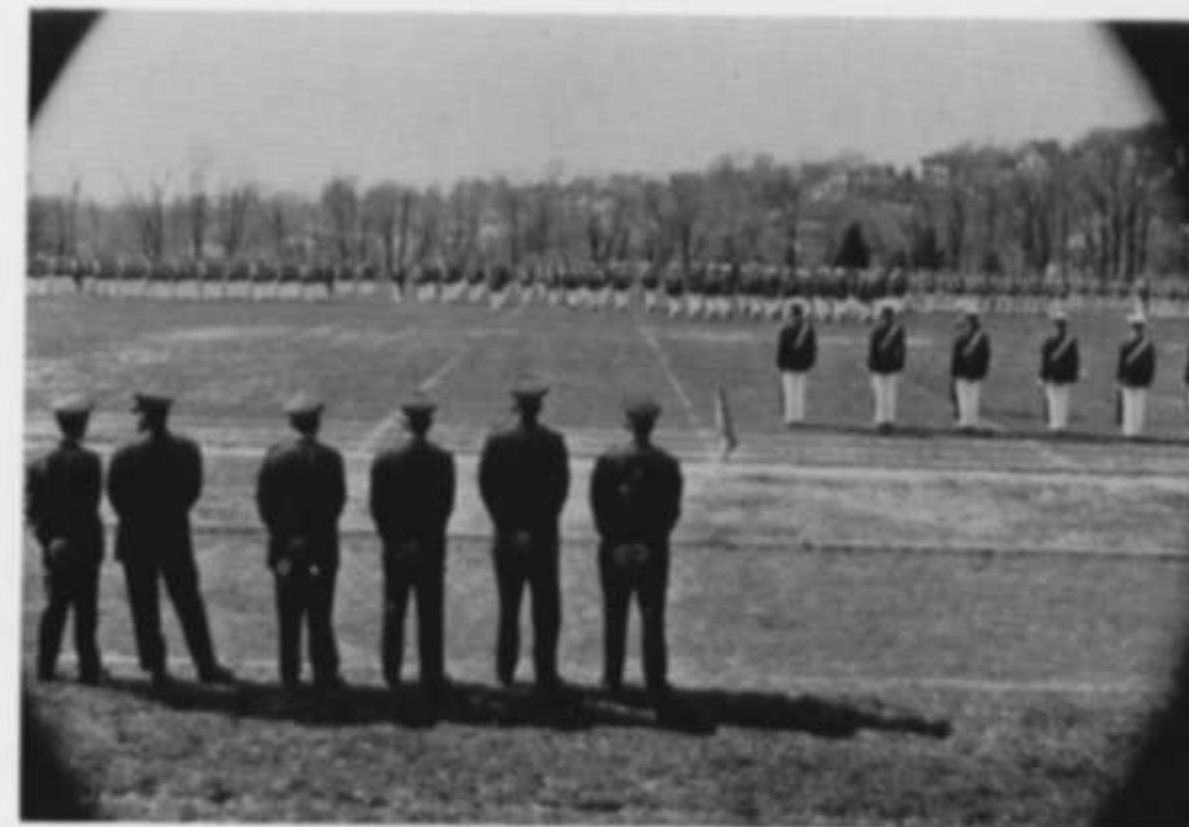
