



St. Francis Prep 25

On a bright autumn afternoon SMA's 1960 gridders opened their home season by dropping a 25 to 0 contest to an aggressive St. Francis Prep team of Pennsylvania. 





PRESIDENT DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER Visits Staunton and The Academy






VETERANS' DAY 11 November 1960


November 4, 1960 SMA 18 Rock Hill Academy 0














