
FOREWORD

THE SCHOOL



Staunton Military Academy was founded in 1860 by William H. Kable, who later served as captain in the Confederate Army. Captain Kable's Academy grew into one of the largest and best known military schools in the country and has maintained its place of prominence throughout the years. The purpose of Staunton Military Academy is to prepare young men through formal education for college.






SMA 63 FISHBURNE 0


SMA 8 HARGRAVE 0








RIFLE TEAM



























PARADES

A feature of the mid-winter military program was a series of road marches. The Corps in fatigues and with slung rifles would hike a distance of one to two miles from the Academy and back.







GOVERNMENT


