







Holding the Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from the University of Virginia, Colonel William K. Dove came to Staunton Military Academy in September 1942. His teaching was interrupted by service in the Navy from March 1943 to September 1946. Since that time he served as teacher of English and later biology. In September 1956 he became Commandant of Cadets and Guidance Officer, a post he held until his retirement in November 1962 to a civilian post in the Office of the Chief of Naval Personnel.

As teacher and Commandant of Cadets Colonel Dove established a reputation for firm discipline, wise tolerance, and sympathetic concern for cadets and their problems.

It is for these years spent in the education of young men that this yearbook is dedicated.






COMMISSIONING OF OFFICERS

VETERAN'S DAY












Staunton 9 — Emory and Henry Frosh 6





A. was again made to bow to the fine Hill-toppers. This hard won victory can be attached to the desire, endurance, and ability displayed by S. M. A. throughout the four quarters, as the team gave one of its best performances of the season.

October 20, 1962
Staunton 8 — Hargrave Military 14
This game was the heartbreak of the season. It was
S. M. A.'s first loss in thirteen games and a loss which

many felt should never have occurred. Mistakes weighed heavily in deciding the outcome of the game, and it was these errors on which Hargrave capitalized to gain the six point winning margin.

October 27, 1962 Staunton 36 —

Greenbrier Military 7
What looked like a hard battle turned into a mild landslide in favor of S. M. A. as the Hilltoppers cruised to a 36 to 7 victory over the West Virginians, with everyone on the Staunton team getting a chance to play. Fumble recoveries by Jeff Phillips and Richard Thompson and a pass interception by Billy Hoy figured vitally in the S.M.A. victory. This was an important game for the Staunton cadets because it once more put them in line for the coveted league championship.

November 3, 1962 Staunton 18 — Columbian Prep 0

Despite a cold, overcast, rainy day, the S. M. A. team displayed a fine effort in downing Columbian Prep. Good defensive play by Ron Barto-lacci, John Topakas, and Sal Garcia kept the visitors scoreless.

November 16, 1962 Staunton 26 — Frederick Military 6

After a close first half, S. M. A. took command of the game and exploded for three touchdowns while holding a big Frederick team scoreless. Again the hard-nosed defense and fast offense of the Hill-toppers shone bright from the opening kickoff to the final gun. Standouts in the game were Topakas, Johnson, and S. M. A.'s two fine quarterbacks, Brooks and Beaver. Adding variety to Staunton's open offensive game were four completed passes for a total of 60 yards.

November 22, 1962 Staunton 13 — Fork Union Military 0

Throughout a season of many memorable games, the FUMA game surpassed them all in tension and excitement. This was the game, the one that would decide the Military League Championship.

The Hilltoppers grabbed the lead midway through the first period on a pass from quarterback Charlie Brooks to halfback Billy Hoy, who sprinted through Blue Devil defenders for a 39 yard touchdown. Tom Anderson's placement gave S. M. A. a 7-0 margin and all it needed to retain the title won last year in the traditional Thanksgiving Day clash. After the score, Coach Steinberg's club played control ball on offense and stopped every Fork Union scoring thrust with an excellent defensive show. The defensive team scored the clincher on the third play of the fourth quarter. When Fork Union tried to punt from its own end zone, Staunton's big co-captain, Terry Sanford, blocked the punt and end Bill Gordon recovered for the final touchdown.
