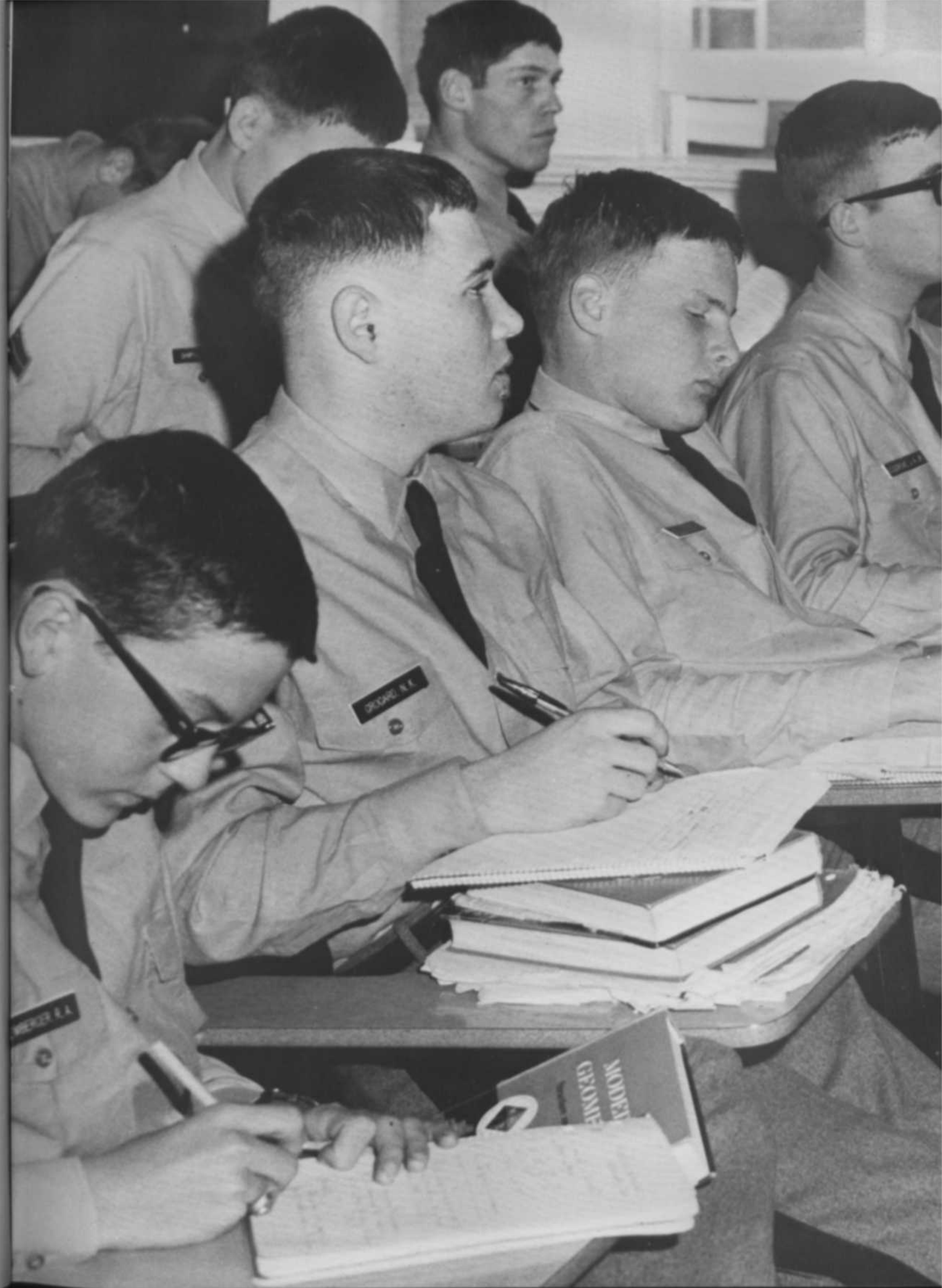

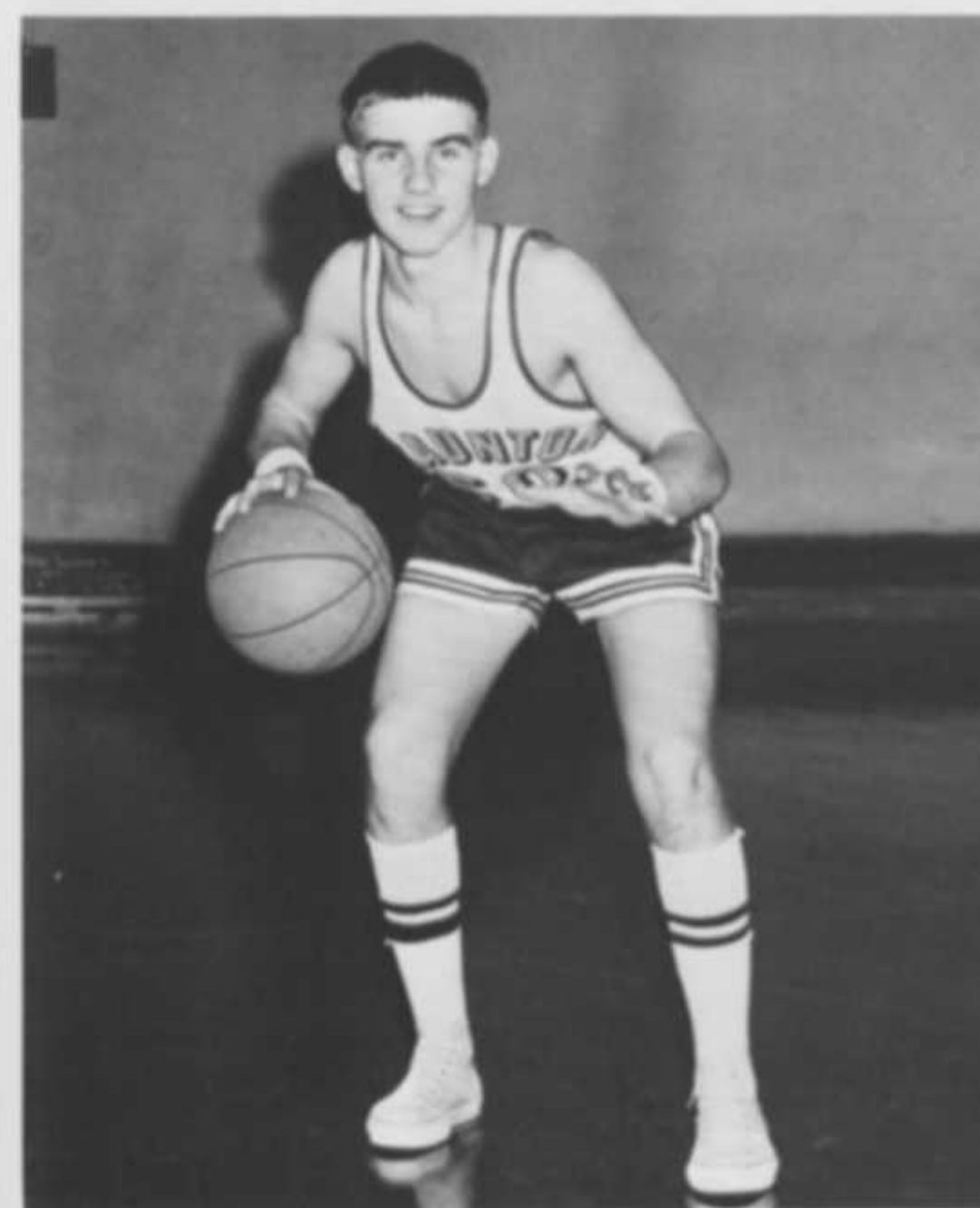

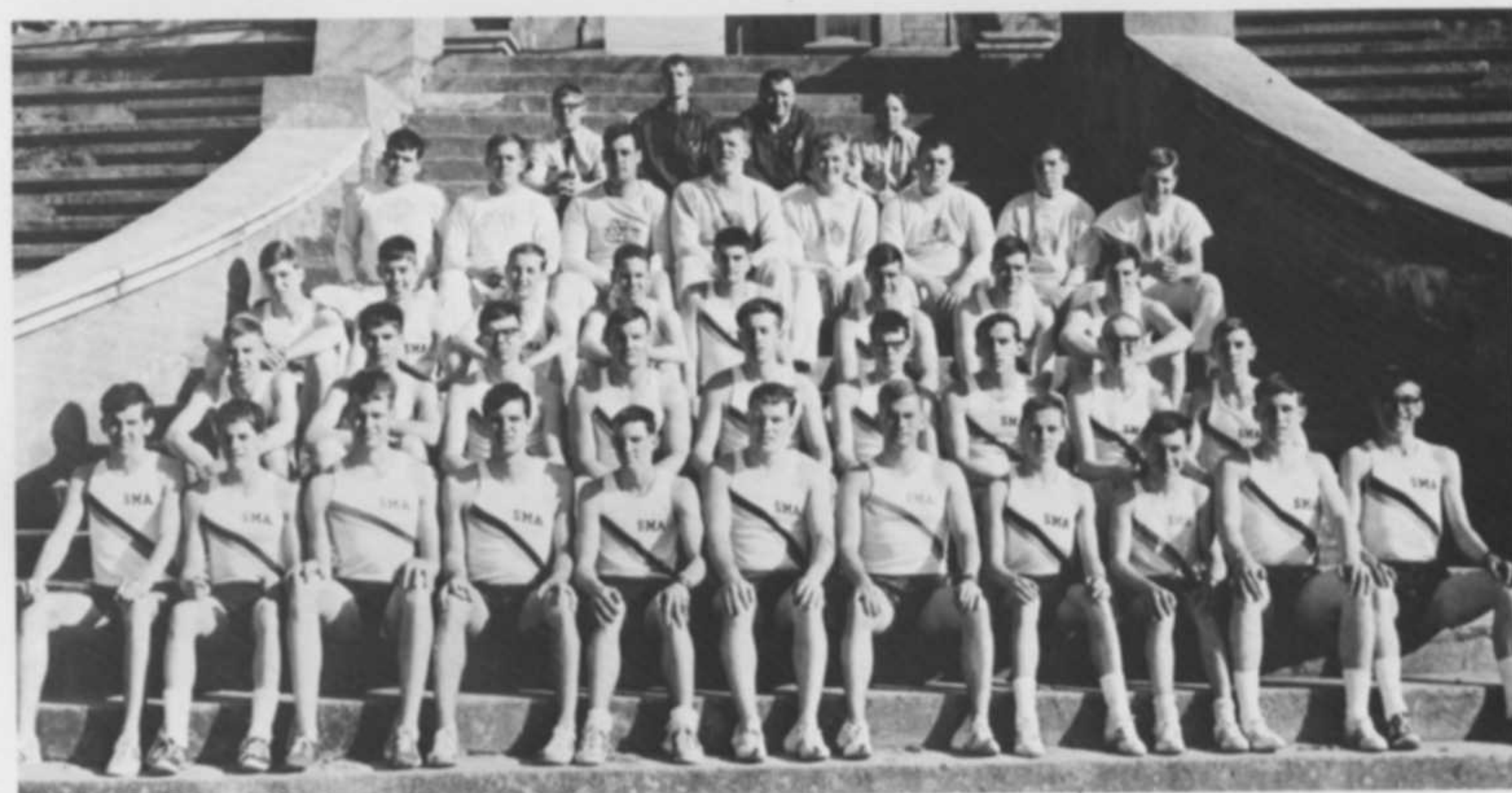

Published three times a year, the Scimitar is used by the cadets as an outlet allowing them to express their feelings and ideas in the form of poetry and prose writings.

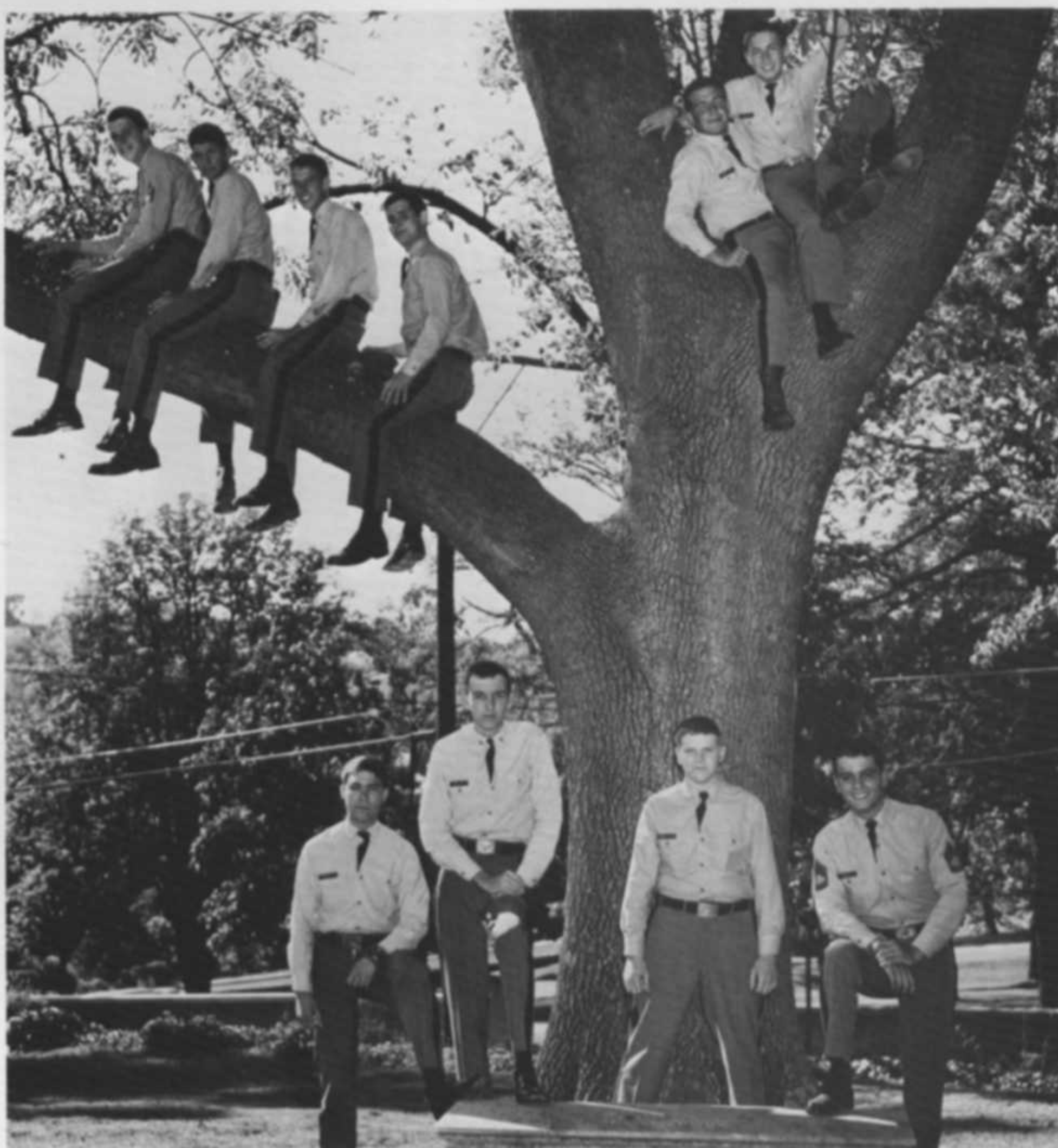
